The National USPS Governing Board met in Greensboro, North Carolina from 14-Sept thru 17-Sept. District 5 attendance was about the normal number of people. Ginny and I attended and represented Delhigh at the meeting held on 17-Sept in the Four Seasons Sheraton. We also attended Friday and Saturday Cocktail Parties in the Commander's Suite, Friday about 200 National people visited our hospitality suite and about 50 D/5 er's visited on Saturday before the banquet. It is fun learning the culture of the area, including the \$5 heaping plate of North Carolina Bar-B-Q and two sides with a \$2 bowl of Brunswick Stew at Stamey's downtown restaurant. The Greensboro area is noted for its furniture manufacturers and sales warehouses, but our poor planning did not provide an opportunity to shop for some needed boat furniture at the annual sales because when we were ready to shop everything was closed on Sunday. Of course we knew that from previous experiences, but senility of two old codgers prevailed and we got nothing done except eat and begin our trip home. Our alternative plan was to drive home on the beautiful Blue Ridge Parkway. And that we did from Winston Salem to Roanoke which was a wonderful ride in the mountains. Monday, we hoped to do the Skyline Drive part of the Appalachia's but now the weather did not co-operate and cloud cover prevailed above 2000 feet. So we drove home at the base of the mountains passing through small towns one might never visit, like Grottos, Shenandoah, Stanley, and Luray. It was definitely cattle country, and picturesque with streams and woodlands. Over the past few years, we have definitely enjoyed the before and after times surrounding the late summer Governing Boards and mid winter Annual meetings.

Well, some may ask what did we do at the Governing Board....glad you asked, if you didn't I'll tell you anyway. On Thursday I attended the National Squadron Development Committee meeting and listened to their presentation on "How to Revitalize a Squadron". The afternoon was the General Meeting for Squadron and District Officers. Friday, I attended two seminars in the morning, one on Radar taught by Bob Sweet and the other a new offering on "Tides and Currents" taught by a member of the National Committee. During the last four years, neither Ginny nor I could attend the many presentations about boating done so well at the National level because of our District involvement; we now have more time to enjoy the good things that are offered. Ginny attended a presentation by Terri Flag on Social Networking, primarily focused on electronic media available today. Terri is a new USPS employee at Raleigh Headquarters chartered to help Squadrons and Districts communicate better. Her services and expertise are available on request. Saturday was the board meeting with various stimulating speeches from the Coast Guard and other safe boating organizations. We partner with many boating organizations including the Safe Boating Councils and Coast Guard Auxiliary. Partnering with the outside boating groups is playing more of a role in USPS, in particular, as related to "On the Water Training" for members (BOC) and newly organized program to do the same for the public who wish training. A grant has provided USPS the ability to purchase a National Training Boat and tow vehicle, both on exhibit at Greensboro. Using this new boat, District 5 will offer on the water training for both members and the public at Passagemaker's Trawlerfest in Baltimore 7-9 Oct and at the Annapolis Sail and Powerboats shows this Fall.

Growing membership is still the primary focus everywhere. At the National level, membership is increasing with the emphasis on the "Coming About" programs. The six month free national membership programs are helping the cause. The new member process is solidly in place to register new members online. A new Delhigh roster will be available on line at the D/5 website very shortly. This can be printed to hard copy for those in need, and available updated all the time for reference. This will happen and be ready before the end of the year. My last comment pertains to a dues increase voted positive at the Governing Board. The amount is another \$2 for individual membership and carried through the family unit. There was little opposition to the increase at the voting to approve, but D/5 and Delhigh did vote against the increase as it does tend to counter the growth of membership.

### Commander Bob's - Let's Not Be Fuelish

How many explosions did you have on your boat the last time you took her out of the slip? None? Well, if you were using an internal combustion engine, you had thousands of explosions within a few feet of you and your passengers. And if those explosions involved a volatile fuel like gasoline, you can be grateful that each of those explosions occurred in a controlled atmosphere like the inside of your engine's cylinders.

Each year, people on or near boats suffer painful and debilitating burns or even death from fuel vapor ignition in an uncontrolled environment. Vapors from leaking fuel lines, corroded fuel tanks or poor ventilation skulk in the low areas of your boat, and create one of the most feared hazards of all. It's a molecular chain reaction, and it's sudden, chaotic... and devastating.

With proper safety procedures and precautions, uncontrolled explosions on board your boat are nearly always preventable. Just remember these equipment and fueling tips:

#### Equipment

Have your fuel lines inspected regularly. Look for loose fittings or cracks in the lines, and if you see a problem, fix it. If you use portable fuel tanks, check them for corrosion or pitting. Make sure the vents work properly, and that there is a vapor-tight, leak-proof cap on the tank. If your tanks are permanently mounted, have them inspected annually. Be certain that they are vented to the outside of the hull, and that fill pipes are outboard so that spills will not end up in closed compartments.

#### Before You Fuel

If you have a boatload of people, and they're not all needed for the fueling process, suggest they leave the boat and go browse around the Marina gift shop. The fewer people around the gas pump when you're fueling the better. If any do insist on staying aboard, remind them not to smoke. Shut off all your engines, electric motors and galley stoves, and close all compartments, ports, windows and hatches. The idea is to keep the vapors out of those areas when you start fueling. Make sure a fire extinguisher is readily available.

If you're refueling portable tanks, take them out of the boat and fill them ashore. If you spill gasoline on the tanks, wipe them off before bringing them back on board.

#### **During the Fueling Process**

Try not to spill fuel on, in or around the boat. In fact, don't spill fuel anywhere. Hold the fill nozzle against the metal side of the fuel filler pipe. The filler pipe is grounded to the bonding system of the boat, and making contact between the nozzle and the pipe at all times will help prevent sparks from static electricity.

#### After You've Finished Fueling Around

Tightly replace the fuel filler caps. Clean up any spills that you weren't supposed to have in the first place, and properly dispose of the rags you use to clean up the mess. Now you're ready to open up all the hatches, ports and compartments that you closed up prior to starting the fueling process. Before you turn on your ventilation blower in the bilge, do one final check for fumes by using your Jim-Dandy, Super-Stupendous, Vapor Detection Gadget...your nose. If you smell gasoline vapors, you're not ready to flip any switches. Find where the fumes are coming from and resolve it. Finally, get your family back on the boat and out of the Marina gift shop while you can still afford to pay for the fuel you just bought.

If you follow these procedures, and make sure your fuel tank and lines are in good condition, you stand a good chance of avoiding an explosion hazard on your boat before, during and after the fueling process. Aside from fueling, however, there is one other piece of advice about the use of gasoline I'd like to impart.

Don't clean engine parts with gasoline. I personally inspected a boat with a strong smell of gasoline in the engine compartment, only to find out that the backfire flame arrestor had just taken a bath that morning in gasoline. The owner was quite proud that he was showing me an oil and grease-free arrestor. I strongly suggested that he clean it off again, this time with hot, soapy water, and let it dry thoroughly before he turned over that engine.

When it comes to gasoline, it's always best to keep the explosions inside the engine. So don't be fuel-hardy -- take the few extra minutes to do it right. It could make the difference between a disaster and another fun day on the water.
