Summer is winding down, back to school and fall sports (soccer) have started for the boys and that means boating days are tapering off. On an impulse we made a last minute reservation for Lake Raystown Resort and took off on a Friday to Sunday excursion before the leaves turned for the season. This was our first time, and we had a lot of fun as a family.

We trailered *Last Call* to the Lake via route 78, 81, and 76. The ride out took just over three hours, and the last ten miles to the lake off the turnpike had sharp turns and swung in grade very fast for a boat in tow. We made a mental note to find an alternate route back.

The resort has a good layout and is trailer friendly thought out the property. There are over 225 cabins plus almost 100 rooms in the lodge area. When we booked, there were only three rooms left in the lodge, and this was the weekend after Labor Day. As we settled in, we discover our room had a gorgeous view of the lake. Outside the lodge are multiple camping areas with benches, fire pits, and grills. We would see this theme though out the property.

We dropped the boat in the water around 1600. We had to use the campsite ramp instead of the marina ramp since they had already lowered the water level by several feet. This was also the main location for trailer parking.

The lake itself is almost 28 miles long with mile markers, starting at one on the north side where the dam is located, down to twenty-nine on the south side. The resort is near mile marker twenty. On our first run we went south towards the higher mile makers. Our depth was about twenty-five feet and we traveled south for about eight miles. As we approached mile marker twenty-seven, the water became very shallow, less than two feet. After we churned up mud with the prop turning around, we took an eighteen mile trip north to Seven Points Marina at mile marker nine. We arrived at 1830 with a quarter tank left looking to fuel up and possibly dock and dine. We found out that after Labor Day, all services shut down at 1700. We left back for the resort traveling south ten miles.

After pulling the boat out of the water and securing the trailer we went to the marina restaurant for dinner. Luckily they were still open, yet all of the regular servers has left for the season or gone back to school. It took way too long for service and the food order did not come out correct. While we were waiting we did meet some of the locals who stayed on their houseboat and they did give us a lot of helpful information as first time visitors and said that when in season the restaurant works like a well-oiled machine.

On Saturday we dropped the boat in the water at 1000. We fueled up at our marina and headed north to the dam. The depth was opposite of heading south, it got deeper the further north we went.

By mile marker fourteen it was sixty feet and by mile marker seven it was 140 feet. When we approached the dam the reading was 195 feet. I thought to myself, I am about fifty feet short on my current anchor line from even reaching bottom at this point. I also noticed that all of the other boats in this part of the lake were adrift, no anchor lines were out.

There was also a distinct change in the water color. By the resort, the water was the usual green brown you would find at Blue Marsh or Beltzville, yet by the dam it was almost a dark blue green. It appeared that you were in a totally different body of water by that point.

On the way back dropped anchor in a cove near mile marker fourteen for lunch. After eating and swimming for a bit, we inflated the tube to pull Oliver on our way back to the resort. We pulled the boat out of the water at 1500. After speaking to some of the locals we decided that we would drive to the neighboring town for dinner.

Route 26 runs the length of the lake on the north side. We went south to the town of Saxton. After passing the one streetlight in the entire town we headed back to the north side of the lake to Huntington. We had better luck finding a steak house and stopped at the ice cream shop across the street.

After dinner we went back to the marina. Under the restaurant is a small arcade the boys spent a few hours in. It connects to the docks and also where the Proud Mary Showboat departs from. Kathy and I watched them dock as they were returning from a dinner cruise.

We left the next morning taking a route from the north side of the lake. It was ten minutes longer, yet much easier to navigate with the boat in tow. All in all it was a great family weekend. Next trip we will try to reserve a cabin on the shore. You can tie the boat off at the beach a few feet away. A lot to do, and worth the drive out.

Once again it is almost time to put our boats in dry dock. This should give you the opportunity to go over all your safety items to make sure they are in proper condition for storage until spring.

If there are any questionable items, give one of our squadron VSC's a call. This will allow you to get the items needed for a speedy VSC examination in spring. Test your lights, horn, bilge pump and blowers; check your flares, life jackets, and first aid kit. Yes, you will have to retest in spring, but at least you know all items were in working condition at the end of the season. If there is a problem in spring it should be a simple fix.

Thanks to everyone that had a VSC completed this year. We are looking forward to ending this year as another success for the VE's.

On 13 August 2016, tragedy struck at Beltzville State Park in the southern foothills of the Poconos, when a fast moving storm came over the lake. The park ranger had just announced over a loud speaker to the swimmers to get out of the water. Then he got the call that several people had been struck by lightning. Grabbing his automatic external defibrillator, he rushed to a man lying on the sand. The ranger and emergency personal worked on the man while the storm raged on. Unfortunately the man was not able to be revived. Several others were injured, but none seriously hurt. Thank You, God. Our prayers go out to the families of the injured and fallen.

The weather on hot days is very unpredictable, and we can never be too careful when we are having a good time, and enjoying life to the fullest. We must always keep a watchful eye on the sky for sudden changes, and keep alert for other dangers that suddenly come our way.

I was hesitant about writing this article, because I don't like to write about tragedies of others but wanted to tell everyone that this is a prime example of how fast good times can turn bad. When on the water, in the water, or on the beach and you're caught in bad weather, head for shelter and stay low.

Let's all be smart and be safe.


