For those who usually attend, you missed a great day on the course! There was a private event on the green (beginner) course so we shot on the orange (intermediate) course.

The event consisted of eight stations along the grounds. Several stations had the clay birds coming over the manmade lake from the quarry dig and out of what was left of buildings adjacent to the dig sites. 


# New PFD Labels

The emerging labels will use the term “Level” on the PFDs, followed by a number. Labels range from “Level” 50 through “Level” 275. Level 50 provides minimum buoyancy and is used in confined or protected waters. Level 275 provides maximum buoyancy and is used in open ocean boating. The increase in level number reflects increasing buoyancy ability, lifting the mouth and nose freeboard higher. PFD education in ABC3 continues to include the legacy “TYPE” labeling since those PFDs will be in use, provided they remain in “serviceable condition,” for several more years. Since students will be exposed to both labeling systems, the 2018 ABC3 manual discussions include both the legacy labels (Type I, II, III, IV, and V) and the new PFD “levels 50 – 275” labeling. The PowerPoint presentation includes examples of the “Level” labels and introduces the icons used to identify use and restrictions. USPS emphasis continues - wear a PFD always when on the water!

<b>50</b> 	 PFD Performance Level	 will NOT generally turn wearers face-up.
<b>70</b> 	 PFD Performance Level	 will NOT generally turn wearers face-up.
<b>100</b> 	 PFD Performance Level	 will turn <b>SOME</b> unconscious wearers face-up.

Once again it is time to put our boats in dry dock. This should give you the opportunity to go over all your safety items to make sure they are in proper condition for storage until spring.

Should there be any questionable items please give one of our squadron VSE's a call. This will allow you to get the items needed for a speedy VSC examination in the spring. Test your lights, horn, bilge pump and blowers. Check your flares, life jackets, and first aid kit.

Yes, you will have to retest in spring, but at least you know all items were in working condition at the end of the season. Any problem in spring should then be a simple fix.





The numbers represent the buoyancy of the life vest and are accompanied by icons depicting the proper use of the life vest (see page 8). Looks like the ABC teachers have some new things to learn!

The Boat Handling manuals are not yet ready so that class will be on hold a little while longer but there are many courses and seminars available online. Please avail yourself of some of these throughout the winter months. You won't regret it!

Fog is essentially a surfaced-based cloud that's most frequently caused by warm moist air moving over a cooler surface, causing condensation. Fog occurs in any recreational boating area, whether over lakes, rivers, coastal or open water.

## Potential hazards

Fog can cause recreational boaters without radar to lose visibility or get lost. If fog begins to form or move in, boats without radar should immediately proceed to a safe anchorage or mooring away from commercial traffic and fairways. Even in shallow seas (less than 50 feet deep) or ground fog, your surface visibility may be only a few feet.

Commercial vessels with high bridges can see over shallow fog, allowing them to continue steaming ahead, while smaller recreational boats are hidden by the fog. Without radar and a competent lookout, continued passage in fog is extremely hazardous for recreational boats.

In the fog, many smaller vessels are invisible on larger ships' radar due to their size and the surface moisture attenuation of radar signals. Adding a radar reflector on your recreational vessel provides an added measure of safety.

While helpful at determining your position, electronic navigation aids such as GPS don't tell you the location or movement of other vessels. If you're equipped with an Automatic Identification System receiver, you'll know the speed and location of other vessels equipped with AIS transmitters; however, you won't know the speed or location of recreational vessels that don't have AIS.

All vessels operating under restricted visibility must sound a horn or bell every few minutes. In fog, use all means available to avoid collision; use radar and a radar reflector as well as lookouts who listen and watch for other boats.

Many recreational boaters continue sailing at cruising speed to outrun fog conditions, but navigation rules caution us to proceed at a safe speed. During fog conditions, our speed should be slow enough to allow us to stop within half the distance of visibility.

Reduced visibility in fog can prevent boaters from observing hazardous sea changes, such as placid waters becoming rough due to changing currents, wind-driven waves or a vessel's wake. During fog-reduced visibility, every person on board should use safety lines, individual harnesses, and personal flotation devices. Boaters should also put on navigation lights and sound the proper signals. In the fog, the chances of someone falling overboard and not being found are significantly increased.


## Practical applications to finding your way

Inexperienced sailors should avoid boating in fog conditions. If transiting in fog can't be avoided, maintaining an effective watch and charting the vessel's progress and position are the most practical steps to take. After observing fog, a vessel's skipper should immediately cross check and plot the vessel's position and progress while determining the best course to safety. Post a designated lookout, deploy the radar reflector, and turn on the radar. Regularly check the VHF weather channels. The U.S. Coast Guard will sometimes broadcast alerts about rapidly developing storms on Channel 16 as well. If possible, anchor out of the travel channel or tie up to a dock until the fog dissipates.


