Please be safe and have fun.





Trailerboat Rendezvous

This past trailer boat rendezvous at Ridley Park was one of my most memorable times on the water boating with family and friends. As much as I love the open waters on the Chesapeake, this was a much closer body of water and a great alternative to Blue Marsh, Beltsville, or even Wallenpaupack. Ridley Park is just over an hour, driveway to ramp from our house in Lower Macungie. The parking lot is spacious for trailer maneuverability and the ramp

fees are reasonable at \$10 weekdays and \$15 on the weekends.

Our first run was at 1100 with P/C Cyrus Nowroozani, JN and P/C Kathleen Nowroozani, SN, Flag Lieutenant Oliver Nowroozani, Vince Nowroozani, Lt/C Doug McKenzie, JN and Kathy McKenzie, P on our boat, Last Call. Eric and Lisa Rhoads brought their new Yamaha 190 jet boat. (Can that thing fly on the water!) They were joined by their Mike and his guest Will. After dropping both boats, we headed north on the Delaware for thirty minutes and then circled back for additional boating guests. As a reference point, we turned around north of the Schuylkill river at about the most southern point of the educational cruise for those that have taken that voyage. It was great to open the boats up, we hit 45 mph at one point and the water was calm enough to cruise at 30 mph most of the way.

Weather was perfect for a day on the water yet it was not all smooth sailing. On our way back to the dock the first time our boat ran aground. Even though we were following the track on the chart plotter from last year, we were in much lower water and not familiar with the hazards in the area. Eric and Lisa were able, in true power squadron form, to help us out of the mud. Good thing their boat only needs fourteen inches of draft!

Once we were underway the second mishap occurred. Our chart potter needed to reboot, and I was not keeping track of visual aids. By the time I identified the number on the next nun (knew we need red 57) I realized I had gone too far. Lesson learned the hard way, know your area and have redundancy outside of your chart plotter for navigation.

After all this excitement we finally made it back to the docks to pick up our additional guests. Last call was boarded by P/C Michael Lebeduik, III, JN and Nikki Lebeduik. Eric and Lisa took Lt/C Gary Corcoran, JN. We boated about two miles north again and found a calm area to drop anchor and raft up. Everyone enjoyed lunch, most had some adult beverages, and the smoking section opened on the platforms for both boats. The water was warm enough to have a few jump in and cool off. We enjoyed the hour and a half of conversation and relaxation as the occasional air plane made its final approach to the Philadelphia airport. When we pulled up anchor we continued north on the Delaware and then west on the Schuylkill. The first few miles were a slalom of turns under bridges in an industrial area. Both boats were wide open throttle at some point, Eric said it felt like we were in a James Bond movie. I could totally see that area perfect for filming a chase/action scene on the water by boat. I will have to remember our martini shaker for the next venture out. Shaken, not stirred.

The river became no wake once we ran parallel to 76 cutting through downtown Philadelphia. It was a fantastic view seeing the city skyline from this vantage point. Reversing course back to the docks took another thirty to thirty-five-minute run. We pulled the boats out of the water and met Cdr Keith Knoblach, AP and Kim Karaman, S. The entire group had dinner at Stinger's Waterfront restaurant. The food was excellent, the drink section was diverse, the service, especially for a large group, was fantastic. All at a reasonable price point. A great day and a wonderful boating experience! We will be back again soon.



Strap in for safety

Prepare for bad weather with the proper equipment

Although most recreational boating is done on days when foul weather, thunderstorms, hurricanes and similar threats aren't expected, several dozen injuries and fatalities occur each year be-



cause boaters were unprepared for rapidly changing weather conditions. The prudent and prepared skipper has sufficient safety equipment for every crew member and guest, and this equipment is readily available, not buried in the bottom of a storage locker out of sight and mind.

Jacklines

Jacklines, or safety lines, are commonly used on sailboats sailing offshore. Jacklines may be made of rope, flat webbing or wire strung from the bow to the stern on both sides of a vessel. Crew members wear a safety harness that can be clipped to the jackline, which allows safe movement about the deck. Jacklines are secured to the vessel by reinforced tie-downs, pad eyes or stanchions on the foredeck. Then they are pulled taut and secured about 6 feet from the transom to prevent a man overboard from washing under the stern and into the propeller.

On sailboats, jacklines should be inside shrouds and other rigging obstructions to permit free movement along the line and deck. On vessels with an open cockpit, you may need several short jacklines to provide safe movement and security for the helmsperson and crew entering or leaving the cabin in rough seas.

Harnesses

A safety harness is not a legally required item; however, it can be an essential lifesaving device during heavy weather boating. Most sailboat and commercial boat crews are familiar with the need for harnesses due to the vessel operating parameters. Many power vessels, because of narrow external walkways, create a need for harness use. A good harness may be commercially purchased and, like a harness fashioned from line, is worn over foul weather gear under the arms and over the shoulders. Harnesses are designed with a safety line to clip onto a jackline or similar safety line, allowing crew members to move about the deck while secured to the vessel. Harnesses and safety lines facilitate the recovery of crew members who have fallen overboard.

Webbing

Frequently used to make commercial safety harnesses and jacklines, flat nylon type webbing has several advantages: It's strong, dries easily, stows conveniently, can be integrated with foul weather gear or life jackets, and spreads the load much better than rope. Webbing will not roll underfoot when accidentally stepped on. Web harnesses are more easily fitted on a crew member, who may object to a rope or line rigged as a harness. You need to use a tether short enough to keep you from going overboard. Attaching the tether to the jackline on the high side of the vessel may be appropriate. If not and you go overboard, you could drown while being towed alongside.

Securing

Harnesses and safety lines do little good if not adequately secured. Never secure a safety line to a railing or any other weak and non-substantial rigging. Safety straps and webbing should be attached with snap links to cleats or running safety lines capable of supporting at least three times the weight of the crew members.

As crew members move about on deck in rough seas using safety lines, they should always use two connecting straps. One strap should always be connected when moving, with the second strap being used to attach to a new connection point before releasing the first strap. If a single strap is used, it should never be released to move to another safety point, since a sudden movement could send the crew member overboard.


