## Executive Officer Lt/C Diane Leasure

Now that spring is in the air and the 2023 boating season is upon us, I hope that our members have taken advantage of the opportunity to have a vessel safety check done to ensure safe passage on the waters.

After Ralph and I attended the national meeting in Orlando at the end of February, we headed to Stuart, Florida for Trawlerfest. One of the classes I took was on galley tips. There were some tips shared in that session that I think are worthy of sharing.

As we are all aware, storage on a boat is not like we have in our homes. The Container Store and similar merchants may just become your best

friends. There are many types of storage containers, colanders, measuring cups and spoons that are collapsible when not in use and take up little drawer or cabinet space. It was also recommended to have different Tervis or other designed glasses on board so your guests will remember which one is theirs - always a problem in our home or on our boat.

Much time was spent on how to manage garbage when you are on-board for more than a few days, so as to not attract flies and other uninvited guests. It was recommended that any food scraps that can be composted be placed in plastic coffee containers and disposed of when you get to a marina or back home if you compost at home. Meat bones can be placed in Ziploc bags and put in the freezer or in a cooler until they can be discarded. I have also personally found that airtight sealed containers - such as those made by Tightvac - are perfect for spices, coffee, tea, rice, and pasta products as the contents stay fresh and the containers cannot be penetrated by insects of any kind.

Please share any of your own galley tips - it is advice that is always welcome!

Even if you can't attend these, I hope you get to spend time out on the water. May is one of the great months for this. It's not too hot, and it's no longer cold. So, get out there!








## **ASPS** Raft Up



## **Kayak Entering and Exiting Safely**Lord of the Electrons, Terry Slattery, Safety Officer

I built a wooden kayak over the winter months and have taken it out a few times now. It's quite a different ride than the old kayak, which has generated some thoughts about entering and exiting kayaks safely. The last thing you want to happen is to fall into cold water.

The old kayak is a tandem model Necky Manitou II that is very stable, making it a nice, safe ride. I've never capsized, even when encountering wakes and waves or

while fishing. It weighs 80 pounds, which requires strength to move on and off the rack as well as a lot of energy to paddle. An outing in it is a good way to build upper body strength. Conversely, it limits the speed and distance that I can go. I was interested in something about the same length but less weight and easier to paddle.

The new kayak is a Petrel Play, a stitch-and-glue model from Chesapeake Light Craft, is the same length as the Necky (14 feet) but narrower, and at only 40 pounds is half that of the Necky. It has watertight compartments in each end accessible via the two hatches. It really needs a spray skirt to keep water out of the main compartment in the event of a capsize. The sleek design is much easier to paddle, which I anticipate opening new paddling destinations.

My normal method of getting into and out of the Necky is to lean on the floating dock, get both feet evenly placed in the kayak, then transition my hands to the kayak coaming and quickly sit down. This worked for my initial boarding of the Petrel Play, even if it was shaky. My exit process for the Necky is to go from sitting to a crouch position, then move my hands to the dock, but this didn't work with the Petrel Play – it's just too tippy. My solution was to paddle to the shallows and just step out (the water was cold in March!). I needed a better, safer method, so I consulted the modern source of How-To examples: YouTube.

There are several methods for entering and exiting kayaks from land and from docks:

- 1. There's the standard shallow water enter/exit method that results in wet feet. Just walk into the water next to the kayak and step in or out. That's what I did to exit the Petrel Play on my first outing, but I was interested in methods that kept me dry and worked in the deeper water next to our dock.
- 2. Next is the paddle as an outrigger across the cockpit, useful for land or docks that are about the same height as the cockpit coaming. One end of the paddle is placed on shore and the other across the rear of the coaming stabilizing the kayak and creating a seat of sorts. Hold the paddle and kayak with one hand, sit on the paddle with the other hand on the shore end, get both feet into the kayak, then slide over and into the seat. Reverse to exit. The paddle bar across the cockpit keeps the kayak stable. https://www.nrs.com/learn/safely-get-in-and-out-of-your-kayak
- 3. Next is the twist and drop or crawl method where the dock is higher than the kayak. Sit on the edge of the dock and put both feet into the kayak. Lay down sideways on the dock and slowly slide off the dock into the kayak, using your feet to keep the kayak close to the dock. Reverse to exit. This may



take some upper body strength to pull up onto the dock when exiting. There are variations on this method where most of your body weight is supported by your arms and you twist and drop to enter or pull up to exit. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=l\_ayzN5N8yw

4. Then there's the three point method, which works for docks of a variety of heights. Stoop or kneel down, grab the front center of the kayak coaming with one hand, keep one hand on the dock, shift one foot at a time into the kayak, then sit down. At all times there are three points of contact: each hand and a foot. Reversing this process requires flexibility and strength to stand up to a crouch position. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=j5x9vjaK7Co

The key requirement in each of these methods is to keep the kayak stable during the transition. I've been practicing these methods to see which one I prefer for our dock. Of course, I wear a PFD and appropriate clothing for the weather.



#### **April Dinner Delights**

If you missed our April dinner meeting, you missed a great presentation by Vicki Saporta. Ms. Saporta was recognized by SpinSheet magazine as their 2022 Volunteer of the Year for all of her efforts in our area. She especially highlighted her work with Sail Beyond Cancer Annapolis. But, she made sure to highlight many volunteer activities that take you out on the water. Here are some of the things she shared.

- Ms. Saporta is currently president of CAPCA a professional organization for Coast Guard licensed captains across the Chesapeake Bay and along the Atlantic Coast. The group offers a monthly presentation as well as sponsoring a YouTube channel.
- CRAB is a local group that promotes boating for therapeutic benefits for people with disabilities, recovering veterans, and underserved communities. CRAB continually needs volunteers willing to help take out groups.
- Another local group seeking volunteers is the USNA Command and Seamanship Training Squadron.
  This group offers summer training for midshipmen.
  Volunteers help teach midshipmen leadership
  skills through 105 hours of sailing in all conditions.
  Volunteers must agree to rigorous training and
  testing before beginning service with this group.
- Don't want to go out, but have a dock? The Oyster Gardening and Restoration Program through the Chesapeake Bay Foundation looks for people willing to care for oyster spat.
- Ms. Saporta especially highlighted Sail Beyond Cancer Annapolis (SBCA). This group honors those challenged by cancer by harnessing the healing powers of wind, water, and sail.
- SBCA offers private sails for family and/or caregivers challenged by cancer. Last year, they sponsored 26 sails for a total of 130 people.
- The group also offers memorial sails for those who've lost someone to cancer.
- You can nominate anyone going through cancer for one of the sails.
- Volunteers are needed and so are boats! Your boat must be 36 feet or longer. Boats are staffed with a captain, a crew member, and an ambassador. The ambassador takes care of outreach, taking pictures of the event, and just generally helping out.
- Many families bring their children. This becomes a great opportunity for families who haven't had the ability to spend quality time together since the beginning of the treatment for cancer.

Ms. Saporta also shared individual stories and photos that showed how much the participants enjoyed and appreciated the opportunity to be out on the water for three carefree hours – a true respite from cancer. Sail Beyond Cancer Annapolis accepted donations at <u>sailbeyondcancer.org</u>. It is a 501(c)3 organization that is supported solely by donations.

If you were unable to join us, you missed a great presentation about opportunities to volunteer in ways that support the joy of boating. As always, we are able to offer dinner meetings that bring together friends who love boating. We also always offer informative speakers, so you can learn something interesting about boating on the Chesapeake Bay and beyond. We look forward to seeing you soon.


