












Usually, November on the Chesapeake is a time to winterize your boat and think back on the fond memories of the sailing season. But, if you are somewhat adventurous, frostbite sailing around Annapolis is one of the Chesapeake Bay's most beloved — and quirkiest — sailing traditions. It's a mix of grit, camaraderie, and cold-weather fun that keeps sailors on the water long after most boats are hauled out for winter.

Here's a full picture of what frostbite sailing means in the Annapolis area:

- ★ Frostbite sailing is winter sailboat racing, typically held from November through March.
- ★ It's called "frostbite" because sailors brave cold temperatures sometimes below freezing to race in short, fast events close to shore.
- * Annapolis, with its sheltered harbor and strong racing culture, is one of the premier frostbite venues in the U.S.

Where It Happens

1. Annapolis Yacht Club (AYC) Frostbite Series

The AYC Frostbite Series is the best-known winter racing program in the region.

Races take place on Sundays, usually starting in early November and continuing into February or March, depending on weather.

The courses are set up in Annapolis Harbor and the Severn River, often within sight of the Naval Academy seawall and the Spa Creek Bridge.

It's a point-to-point or short-course series — quick races, no long-distance sailing.

2. Eastport Yacht Club (EYC)

Eastport sailors are just as enthusiastic; many compete in AYC's races or organize informal "beer canstyle" frostbite sails.

The EYC crowd often sails smaller boats (like J/22s or Harbor 20s) and has a strong post-race social scene.

3. Severn Sailing Association (SSA)

SSA, known for dinghy racing, occasionally runs small-boat frostbite regattas — particularly for Laser (ILCA), Vanguard 15, and similar classes.

Dinghy sailors race in drysuits and often pull their boats up the beach at the end of each race day.

Conditions and Safety

Frostbite sailing requires special preparation:

Cold Weather Gear: Drysuits, neoprene gloves, fleece layers, and boots are essential.





Short Races: Usually 30–45 minutes each — limits exposure and keeps racing lively.

Safety Boats: Always on the course for quick recovery if someone goes overboard (water temps in November can be near 50°F and drop to the 30s by January).

No Spinnakers Rule: In very cold weather, some fleets restrict spinnakers to reduce risks and gear tangles.

The Culture

Frostbite sailing is as much social as competitive.

After racing, sailors gather at clubhouses or local pubs like the Eastport Yacht Club, Boatyard Bar & Grill, or Pusser's to warm up, share stories, and celebrate (or commiserate).

It's seen as a badge of toughness — you'll hear sailors proudly say, "We never put the boat away."

Schedule Snapshot (Typical Year)

Early November: Series begins (AYC Frostbite Series kicks off first weekend).

December–February: Weekly Sunday races continue, weather permitting.

March: Final races and awards ceremony, often with a social event at AYC.

Where to Watch

Naval Academy seawall and Spa Creek Bridge offer great public vantage points.

Ego Alley and City Dock also provide good views of the harbor starts and finishes.

On windy days, it's a dramatic scene — whitecaps, tight starts, and bundled-up sailors.

As we've often been reminded, seeking new members is the <u>responsibility of</u> all of us. A growing membership is a healthy membership!









When Should You Replace a Chain Rode? Lord of the Electrons, Terry Slattery, Safety Officer

I was at a boating event recently when someone asked "Do you know anything about when I should replace my all-chain anchor rode?" My short answer was "Yes," having researched the subject several years ago when I began to question the integrity of our rusty anchor chain.

A good anchor system should be tailored to the expected anchoring environment. Boats that are expected to anchor in

deep or abrasive environments like rocks or coral should use all-chain rodes. However, in the soft environment of the Chesapeake Bay, an anchor + chain + rope rode will work. Note: I think that the only anchoring system that doesn't have to include chain is a dinghy shore anchor.





There are multiple sizes and types of anchor chain. The links in quality chain will have a grade number stamped into the side of each link. The most common for use on boats is G4 (Grade 40), which is a high-carbon steel that is suitable for use in a windlass, due to strength and durability. You should avoid the use of less expensive grades like G3 (Grade 30), which is made from low-carbon steel for lighter applications. By the way, stainless steel chain exists but is not as strong as the high-carbon steel of G4 (yes, that's a 'G4' stamp on the link in the picture).

Carbon steel chains are galvanized to help protect them from corrosion. Galvanizing will eventually wear away, leaving the carbon steel subject to salt water corrosion. When that happens, you'll start to see flakes of rusty steel deposited on deck as the chain comes aboard after anchoring. When that happens, the chain's lifetime becomes questionable. You can slow the start of corrosion

by having the chain re-galvanized from time to time, but that's an expensive step that rarely works for very long. A better approach is to replace the chain. You can also periodically swap the chain end-for-end, provided that the chain is of sufficient length. Regularly washing the chain with fresh water will also extend its life.

Ok, so you've decided that re-galvanizing or swapping the chain end-for-end isn't an option, at what point should the chain be replaced? It took me a while to find an answer to this question. The short answer is that I decided that 11% erosion was my threshold for replacing the chain. A 10mm (3/8 inch) chain's nominal link diameter of .394 means that the minimum link diameter should be .350 inches. The long answer, which includes my analysis and references, can be found at our LUX blog:

I quickly found several chain links that were at my threshold for replacement, causing us to replace our anchor chain. If you're faced with a similar decision, I'd recommend a threshold of no more than 15% erosion. I recommend using the same rule to the shackles and to shorter lengths of chain in an anchor rode that's used in the Chesapeake Bay.

We anchor in depths less than 30 feet, so we purchased 200 feet of chain and took the old chain to a metal recycling facility. The new chain is working out well for us. We wash it on a regular basis to help reduce corrosion. We also periodically replace the galvanized shackle that connects the anchor to the chain allowing us to sleep soundly on anchor at night, even when it's windy.
