the winter months, there will





When I was living in New England, I was familiar with the Newport to Bermuda Race, which is the oldest regularly scheduled ocean race in the world. I was not aware of the Annapolis to Bermuda Race (A2B) until I moved to Maryland.

Origins & Evolution

The very first Annapolis to Bermuda Race took place in 1979, with just seven yachts participating in an informal competition. (https://www.bermudaoceanrace.com/) Due to its success and growing interest, the race became a biennial event starting in 1980.

Race Structure & Highlights

The A2B is unique in combining both inshore and offshore racing. Competitors start down the Chesapeake Bay, navigate the Gulf Stream, and finish in Bermuda, covering approximately 753 nautical miles—one of the longest ocean racing courses on the U.S. East Coast.

It is co-hosted by Eastport Yacht Club (Annapolis) and the Royal Hamilton Amateur Dinghy Club (Bermuda).

Accessibility & Community

A2B is known for welcoming both seasoned racers and enthusiastic cruisers, encouraging broader participation and navigation skill development.

Organized seminars—focusing on Safety at Sea, navigation, and boat prep—are offered by Eastport Yacht Club to prepare entrants.

Milestones & Memorable Moments

In 1986, the first all-women crew participated aboard the Swan 37, William Tell. Despite skepticism, they completed the race, earning a special trophy and marking a milestone in inclusivity and gender representation in sailing.

The 2020 race was cancelled, the first cancellation since the inaugural race, due to COVID-19, border closures and logistical challenges.

The race resumed in 2022, overcoming a 24-hour delay caused by Tropical Storm Alex, with a competitive fleet of roughly 25–29 boats.

Legacy & Future

Over the years, the race has seen participation from over 600 yachts and thousands of sailors who have experienced its technical and navigational challenges.

Registration is now open for the 2026 Mustang Survival Annapolis to Bermuda Ocean Race, scheduled to start June 5, 2026.



September Dinner Meeting Speaker

The speaker for our September meeting will be Christopher Sniezek. He is the Executive Director of the Star-Spangled Banner Flag House and Museum in Baltimore, Maryland. He will be giving a presentation on Mary Pickersgill who once resided in the house.

The Star-Spangled Banner Flag House in Baltimore, Maryland, is a significant historical site where the American flag that inspired the national anthem was crafted.

Built in 1793, the house became the residence of Mary Young Pickersgill in 1807. In 1813, she, along with her daughter Caroline, mother Rebecca Young, and 13-year-old African American indentured servant, Grace Wisher, sewed a massive 30-by-42-foot garrison flag. This flag flew over Fort McHenry during the British bombardment in 1814, inspiring Francis Scott Key to write "The Star-Spangled Banner," which later became the U.S. national anthem.

Today, the Flag House operates as a museum preserving early 19th-century American history. Visitors can explore:

The Historic House: Restored to reflect the period when the Pickersgill family lived there.

Modern Museum Wing: Features exhibits on the War of 1812, the Battle of Baltimore, and the flag's creation.


Notable Displays: Includes a large window replicating the original flag's design and a U.S. map made from stones representing each state.



To get there, take your car off autopilot. Do <u>not</u> turn into the Elks Club. Continue south on Route 2 over the bridge. Keep going through Edgewater, crossing MD 214. Turn left at Colony Crossing. Then, turn right to get to the club house.



ASPS began the summer season with two ABC classes. We had a group of 10 middle-schoolers from Popular Point Marina. The instructors were Jeff Mckenny and Mike Maszczenski. All our students passed and received their boating safety cards. We had a second group from Epping Forest arranged by Eddie Chapman. The instructors were Richard (Dick) Radlinski, Richard Hughes and Mike Maszczenski. We had a group of 18 boaters with one person auditing. Everyone passed their test, and all now have their boating safety cards.

Boating Safety Card update: Many states are no longer grandfathering people into the program for the now-required boating safety course card needed to operated a recreational vessel. 36 states require a boating

safety course be passed to operate a recreation vessel in their state waters, regardless of the age of the operator. At this time, Maryland does not require the card for anyone born before July 1972. New York and many other states are passing laws no longer grandfathering the need for the card. New York recently passed Brianna's Law affectively eliminating the grandfather exception. Many states are considering the same. Make sure you know where you card is, if you have one. If you do not have one (regardless of your age), you might consider getting a boating safety course card. You can take the class online, or sign up the next time ASPS offers one. There are also any number of local organizations teaching the course. If you like virtual instruction, the America's Boating Clubs page now lets you search for courses not only close to you but all courses being offered virtually over Zoom. Check it out.





Planning for Emergencies - Part 2 Lt/C Georgiana Maszczenski, S

We tend to think of Maryland as a safe place to live. We don't face wildfires like California. We don't have massive flooding issues like Tennessee. As a rule, we don't really worry about having to evacuate or dealing with the loss of our home. Actual statistics show us that we should give more thought to planning for emergencies. After all, Maryland records currently show that the last time we had so many flash flood warnings was 2020. And it is only September. Severe thunderstorms across Maryland have resulted in thousands losing power, and people find themselves needing water rescues. In mid-May, flooding caused by days of heavy rain led to millions of dollars in damage and emergency responses

in Western Maryland communities. Waterspouts have formed on the bay, and turned into tornados upon reaching land – destroying homes and property along the way. To date, there have been six fire fatalities in Anne Arundel County – also resulting in the loss of the homes. Several instances of trees falling on houses were reported so far this year – in places as widespread as Chesapeake Beach, Mechanicsville, and Silver Spring. These events caused property damage. Some even resulted in the residents being forced to evacuate. You might realize at this point that your neighbors can remain safe while you face having to leave your home!

In our area, it's more likely that you will need to leave your home for a short amount of time. However, you won't always have a lot of time to prepare for that evacuation. The time to prepare is now. In this second installment of Planning for Emergencies, we'll look at things you can do to be prepared. After all, a great saying is, "Hope for the best. Prepare for the worst."

In today's world, technology is your friend. Make full use of it as part of your emergency preparedness! Make sure your technology is ready to be your support. Here are some ideas you might want to consider:

- ★ Consider signing up for direct deposit and electronic banking if you have not already done so. With this, you can access your money and make electronic payments wherever you are.
- * If severe weather is predicted, take time to make sure your electronic devices are fully charged. You never know how long the power might be off in your home.
- ★ Consider purchasing a portable charger power bank for your devices especially your phone. Today's cell phones are more than just phones. Your phone can give you emergency alerts and warnings. Make sure you keep the portable charger power bank fully charged if storms are on the way.
- ★ Keep a portable phone charger in your car at all times.

Now that you know how to keep your electronic devices up and running in any emergency, let's explore how you can use those devices. Start with all the important documents that you might need. Think about insurance policies, identification documents, and medical records. Here are some ways to make sure they are always available.


- ★ Use your printer to scan important documents. You can store them on your home computer. Even better email them to yourself so that you can store them on your phone.
- ★ Still too much work? Use your phone's camera to take pictures of your documents. Follow that with photos of important cards your driver's license, credit cards, and any other cards you use regularly.



★ Use your computer to create your own medical records. Include all the important information. Most importantly, be sure to have a complete list of your medications as well as details about your local pharmacy. Save that form as a PDF, and send it to yourself so that you can store it on your phone.

A final note – if you are concerned about losing your phone, you can also save these documents in an online storage site.

At this point, you hold all your important information in the palm of your hand. Information is power, but you need more than information if you have to evacuate. Our next installment will share ideas about what you should have in readiness in case of a quick departure!
