



VSC Corner

With the cold weather upon us and everyone preparing their boats for winter storage, here are a few suggestions.

Remove the batteries and store them on a block of wood where it is warm and can't freeze. Older batteries can lose voltage over the winter.

Take life jackets, removable seats, electronics, and first aid kits and store them in a dry location. Open compartments to let air flow through to keep moisture from building up. I'm planning to put a Damp-Rid container in my boat to try to reduce any mold from developing.

When covering your boat, try to use a cover with vents to allow expansion and heat release to avoid moisture inside.

Be sure to drain water from the engine and fill it with winter coolant to keep the engine from freezing, thus saving you a costly repair. If the boat is stored on land, remove the drain plug from the hull and any live wells.

Drain water heaters and be sure to pump out any freshwater tanks or toilets. Drain or fill fuel tanks to avoid condensation.

These are only a few items to keep in mind, but with a larger boat, more must be done. By taking the time to care properly for your boat now, you will hopefully have fewer problems when opening your boat next season. Happy Holidays to all. Have fun in all you do.

Executive Officer's Report P/C Robert Rendish, P

As the boating season is ending, I'm reminded of the basic courtesies that we both teach and learn in our safe boating classes, and practice on the water. It was a beautiful October Saturday, and the last day I had the boat out before winterization.

We went to Beltzville Lake, one of our close favorite bodies of water, where upon arrival at the preparation area, it started to get busy with boaters pulling in to prep their boats for a last day of good weather boating. As we were launching the Stingray, the rig next to us on the ramp started to have some problems. The captain didn't feel his boat was deep enough in the water to launch, and he couldn't start the engine. As the trailer backed further down the ramp, the captain was finally satisfied with the depth of water, released his winch strap, and was now loose, but starting to drift towards my boat. Fortunately, Mark and I were watching this captain who was obviously ill-prepared and took measures to prevent him from drifting into my boat. He then jumped into the water and "walked" his boat over to the courtesy dock. Later, we saw him out on the water fishing with his friend.

While waiting for my brother, Mark, to pick me up at the courtesy dock after I parked the rig, a brand-new twin-engine jet boat bow rider was attempting to dock at the courtesy dock. The two young men in the boat were not prepared; no fenders deployed, no lines attached to cleats to tie off or throw to their waiting passengers, and unskilled at bringing the vessel alongside the dock.

Once they were close enough, the one passed a line to a waiting passenger who grabbed the line, only to bring the line in, which was let go by the person in the boat. The boat continued moving forward towards another boat, and the jet boat had to back away abruptly to avoid any collisions. Other boaters, either trying to pick up or drop off passengers, were forced to use the smaller courtesy dock in more shallow water.

In conclusion, pay attention at whatever Safe boating class you take from either the Coast Guard Auxiliary, Pennsylvania Fish & Boat Commission, or the more detailed, informative, United States Power Squadron, America's Boating Club Safe boating classes taught by more seasoned, well experienced, courteous boaters.

Unfortunately, this was not a good way to end the boating season with several examples of rude, inconsiderate, non-courteous boaters. I hope they will learn better boating in the off season.

Pick the right towing vehicle for your boat




When it comes to trailering, picking the right towing vehicle for your boat matters. A common misconception is that any vehicle with a tow ball or a trailer will work. Nothing could be further from the truth. Every type of vehicle has specific limits on what it can safely tow.

Front-wheel drive

Front-wheel drive dramatically improves a vehicle's handling and traction, improving safety when road and driving conditions deteriorate. Although designed to be light and efficient, a

front-wheel drive may not be powerful enough to pull a trailer.



Front-wheel drives don't perform well on a boat ramp because the trailer's weight on the vehicle's rear transfers weight off the front wheels, causing them to lose traction.



Another innovation resulting in reduced towing ability is the unibody platform on which nearly every car is now made. A rigid sheet-metal shell, the unibody doesn't have a separate, underlying steel frame, which is still common on conventional full-size pickups and SUVs.

Vehicles with a strong frame bolted to a separate body have greater lateral stability, making them less subject to sway. The additional braking and steering loads imposed by towing have less effect, and the separate frame provides a strong mounting point for a trailer hitch.

Engine

Designed to maximize fuel economy, today's small-displacement, high-revving, multicam, multi-valve engines pack a lot of horsepower but lack the low-end torque needed to get a load moving.

Cooling components

Towing creates a lot of heat that needs to be removed from the engine and engine compartment. Big, efficient radiators, transmission coolers, and engine oil coolers are essential when towing. Lacking these heavy-duty cooling components, most today's cars have reduced tow ratings.

Brakes

As cars became smaller and lighter, car brakes became smaller as well, making them insufficient to stop an extra ton or more of boat and trailer.

Bottom line

With a few exceptions, today's state-of-the-art cars are not up to the task of towing a boat and trailer combo weighing more than 1,000 pounds. If you want to tow a boat these days, you are probably going to be happiest with a full-size pickup, sport utility vehicle or crossover utility vehicle.

When it comes to buying a vehicle to tow your new boat, look closely at the tow ratings specified in the owner's manual. The manufacturer's ratings are derived from rigorous testing, and you expose yourself to potential danger and legal liability if you tow a boat that exceeds your vehicle's rating capacity.


