



Out-of-date fire extinguishers were the reason for not passing some of the vessel safety checks we did. Some of the owners thought since it was charged, it was okay. Remember fire extinguishers are good for twelve years from manufacturing date on boats, and must be Coast Guard approved. Check your extinguishers for compliance.

Check your navigation lights. Even if you only boat in the daytime, they still have to work. Finding out they don't when you need them can be very frustrating.

Summer has brought us some hot and turbulent weather to test our knowledge of what to do in order to stay safe. Remember to have plenty of water so you stay hydrated and know sunscreen is always recommended. Even on some overcast days, you can burn without realizing it.

If you see someone in distress, render aid to the best of your safety. It's the law and the right thing to do and one day you may be the one in need of help.

Executive Officer's Report P/C Robert Rendish, P

I have been boating in some form or another for a long time, since I was a very young boy. Whether it was a 12 foot aluminum rowboat, or a 10 foot AMF Sunfish sailboat, or when I was introduced to powerboats on Lake Harmony, Pennsylvania by my cousins, I always met good people on the water.

I have written before about joining Delhigh Power Squadron, and meeting such great, friendly, generous people with a passion for boating, teaching safe boating, and sharing their experiences with all of us. One recent example of this friendliness and this passion for boating, was several weeks ago.

This was the first time out on the water with my boat, it's shakedown run. The boat started fine, and it ran and performed well all day.

Later in the afternoon, my brother was at the helm slowly going into a cove area to check out. We looked around this cove to beach the boat for a while, but there was no suitable area to do so. So, he started to back the boat out of this cove and turn around.

When he put the boat in drive, there was no forward propulsion; a shift lever cable broke, and we found ourselves stuck in reverse, with no forward drive. We didn't have neutral either.

We were shocked to have such a failure as this, as the boat was running and performing well all morning. Mark and I checked the engine compartment and cables, but found nothing we could determine to be broken.

We decided to start heading back to the launch ramp, which was about 2 miles away, in reverse, at a very slow speed. This was going to take a few hours, so we decided to wave a distress signal to get some help. We were successful in getting the attention of a boat, and they proceeded to approach us to offer assistance. And they did. We met this great family with a 22 foot Monterey I/O, and they offered to tow us back to the launch ramp. All went well with the tow, and they maneuvered us alongside the courtesy dock, where we tied off.

I went to get the rig, got to the ramp, and backed the trailer down the ramp to retrieve the boat. Before I realized it, Phil the owner of the boat who towed us back, was in the water with his son, floating the boat over to the trailer. I thought this family left after we tied up at the courtesy dock. But they didn't. They stayed to help.

We got the boat on the trailer, secured it, and pulled off the ramp. I was so thankful and grateful to Phil, his son and family.

I offered him money for his efforts and his time helping us out. I offered him cash several times, but he refused each time. I told him again how thankful we were for towing us back. I then offered to pay for him and a family member to take our ABC Safe Boating Course. I gave him our squadron business card with my name and phone number, and the written promise by me to pay for their Safe Boating class. Like I have said before many times, I have met some great people when I joined the squadron, I have also met other great people outside the squadron, and continue to meet fellow boaters who are friendly, helpful, and such decent, generous people.

The keys to better boating decision-making



Good boater judgment, or boating decision-making, is critical to the safe operation of recreational boats as well as accident avoidance.

Despite the advancements to boating safety, it's the human factor that often leads to error. The most frequent causes of accidents include operators who lack boating safety knowledge, operate in heavy weather, use alcohol, overload the boat, are inattentive, don't provide a proper lookout, and disregard the navigation rules.

Boating decision-making provides a systematic approach to risk assessment and stress management. To understand boating decision-making is to understand how personal attitudes can influence decision making and how those attitudes can be modified to enhance safety in all aspects of boating.

The VEEP checklist

One way to mitigate risk is to perceive hazards. By incorporating the VEEP checklist into pre-cruise planning, the boater divides the risks into four categories: vessel, environment, external pressures and person in command.

With the VEEP checklist, boaters can easily remember the categories they should examine for risk before each cruise. Once the operator or person in command identifies the risk factors, that person must decide whether the risks can be managed safely and successfully. If not, the operator can decide to cancel the cruise.

If the person in command decides to continue the cruise, he or she should develop strategies to mitigate the risks. One way a boater can control risks is to set personal minimums for items in each risk category. These limits are unique to the boater's current experience and proficiency.

One of the most important concepts that safe captains understand is the difference between what is "legal" in terms of the regulations and what is "smart" or "safe" in terms of boater experience and proficiency.

Vessel

What limitations will the vessel impose upon the trip? Ask the following questions:

- Is this the right boat for the cruise?
- Am I familiar with this type of boat?
- Is this boat equipped for the cruise? Are the instruments, lights, and communication and navigation equipment adequate?
- Can this boat use the available marinas, and do they provide pump-out stations and fuel supplies needed for the cruise?
- Can this boat carry the necessary supplies?
- Does this boat have sufficient fuel capacity with reserves for planned cruise legs?

Does the fuel quantity delivered match the fuel quantity ordered?

Environment

With weather being a major environmental consideration, boaters should set personal environmental minimums, especially when it comes to weather. While evaluating the weather for a particular cruise, the operator should consider the conditions for the entire transit, including current predictions (coastal and ocean), near-term and long-range weather predictions from weather services, safe havens and foul weather anchorages, and alternate destinations.

Additionally, the operator should answer several questions:

• What navigation aids can you expect to see during the cruise? What are their shapes, lights and sound characteristics? List all known characteristics for reference. Plot all known hazards on a properly scaled chart.

Does the clothing locker contain appropriate foul weather gear for the voyage?

External pressures

External pressure, or influences external to the cruise, create a sense of urgency to complete a voyage, often at the expense of safety. This category often causes the person in command to ignore all other risk factors, which makes managing external pressure key to risk management.

You can manage external pressures by using personal standard operating procedures, such as allowing time for an extra fuel stop and having alternate plans for a late arrival. The key is to be ready for and accept delays. Remember that travel delays happen whether you're traveling by boat, plane, car or bus. As the person in command, your goal is to manage risk, not create hazards.

Person in command

One of the risk factors on a cruise, the person in command must ask, "Am I ready for this trip?" in terms of experience and physical and emotional condition. A successful person in command can successfully concentrate, manage workloads and perform several simultaneous tasks.

Historically, the term operator error has been used to describe a boating accident in which an action or decision made by the person in command caused or was a contributing factor in an accident. This definition also includes the person in command's failure to make a correct decision or take proper action. A single decision or event does not lead to an accident, but a series of events and decisions can form a chain of events leading to a poor outcome.

Using the VEEP checklist to develop strategies to mitigate your risk on the water can keep you and your passengers safe.


Did You Know?
