Baltimore Boat Show - 2018

Thanks to all who participated, including behind the scenes, and my “sidekick” Glenn !!!

Some statistics: We had a total of 37 hours that our booth was open. There were 34 attendees sign up for information. Susan Rudy got 7 possible leads for DSPs. I tally about 111 hours of DSPs member’s time. There were 81 people who used the Virtual Trainer. 67 were male and 14 were female. The ages ranged from 1-50+ with most of them being up to 12 years old. There were 8 between 13-18; 5 between 19-30; 13 between 30-50 and 14 in the over 50 age group.

Spring Conference is coming up 6-8 April 2018 at The Princess Royale in Ocean City. Friday evening are the Hospitality Suites. The theme for our suite is Membership Involvement, Recruitment Organization & Retention. The Acronym is “MIRROR” (What is the 3rd “R”? Responsible/Responsibility?) Mirror, mirror on the wall.... Maybe we should develop a better acronym!?! We need our DSPS members to help plan and man the suite. Who would like to help? I would like to hold a meeting to begin planning around February 28th. Let me know when it’s a good time and if you would like to meet at my place. We will discuss decorations (maybe fishing poles, nets?), food, drinks, activity, prizes &/or handouts, etc.

Vessel Safety Checks:

We have received 70 VSC stickers of which 40 have been requested & handed out. We really need additional members to become VE’s. We need to set some goals and decide when & where we hold the “1st major attack”.

As you may have heard Mary and I just purchased a new to us Symbol Pilot House 557. For us it is a much larger boat with a ton of new things to learn. We're also getting a chance to put some of the stuff we learned from the squadron to good use. Especially Cruise and Cruise planning. Typically we cruise around with other members who are on their own boats. Each boat is responsible for its own crew, supplies and navigation. With the new boat we've been cruising with other members and friends. This involves working out crew

schedules, duties, responsibilities and menus. We will also have to figure out how to pair up crew members based on their skills and experience. For example the return trip may take up to nine days and include a couple of nights of offshore cruising. We'll also be recording fixes, checking fuel, water and mechanical systems at regular intervals while underway. We may also have the chance to do some true celestial navigation at sea.

Cruise and cruise planning covers all these topics and gives some options on how to address them. One thing that is always important is to be flexible. Weather will dictate whether run the ICW or outside in the ocean. Or it may even keep us in port for a day or two. Just as important as the weather will be the crew. On a 30 hour run we'll need to make sure we share the duties and that everyone gets enough private time, rest and of course responsibilities.

As SEO I'm working to provide everyone in the squadron the educational opportunities they are looking for. Please contact me to let me know what you are interested in taking and I'll try to get scheduled for you. See below for the currently scheduled courses. Contact me and sign up!

TRUFFLE, The Boating Safety Dog!!!!

Greetings, boaters! No breaking news in the world of note-taking, thankfully, so here's a check of the newswires:

- From Chesapeake Bay magazine's online news, 1/30/2018, I learned that a pair of TowBoat US captains, a father and son, were awarded BoatUS's Meritorious Service Award. John Dalmas had gone overboard in a severe squall that popped up on an afternoon last July. A search commenced when his 25 foot sailboat was found aground without him near Sparrow's Point. Captains Dale and Austin Plummer heard the radio report at home, and headed out in their towboat. Searching til dark , they found Mr. Plummer, who had been in the water for about 7 hours off of North Point. He had life jackets, but wasn't wearing one when he went over. Fortunately, he is now OK, and the wiser for it. Congratulations, Captains!
- From the online sailboat racing magazine Scuttlebutt, 1/31/2018, I learned that the only American stop for the 2017-18 Volvo Ocean Race is scheduled for May8-20, 2018, in Newport, Rhode Island.
- Speaking of the Volvo race, on January 19, 2018, a collision occurred between Vestas 11th Hour Racing and a non-racing vessel. The incident took place around 30 miles from the Leg 4 finish line in Hong Kong. The sailboat apparently ran into a local fishing boat at speed. The fishing boat sank; the 10 aboard were rescued but one later died. These sailboats can do 30 knots, so they can sneak up on unwary skippers. An investigation is ongoing. This information is from www.volvooceanrace.com.
- From DNR: In the unlikely event that we hold or attend a gathering that will have a congregation of more than 100 vessels in a specific area of water that lasts more than 3 hours and might create an unusual hazard to navigation – like Lt. Rudy's popular celestial navigation refresher, some day! - DNR offers a Marine Gathering Permit. The regulations and a FAQ fact sheet can be found on their website at http://dnr.maryland.gov/Boating/Pages/marine_gatherings.aspx.

On a personal note, I had fun at the Baltimore Boat Show – I got to play with the boating simulator and help with the electronic Fire Extinguisher demonstrator. (After the first time I played with that thing, I ran out and got two additional fire extinguishers for the boat the next day – it's amazing how short a time they last, and fiberglass boats are basically solidified petroleum).
