Educational Officer's Report

Spring is not too far away and our thoughts must inevitably turn to dusting off our beloved boats and getting them ready to go for another season. It is often a good idea to read the manuals for the systems on our boats. This can be done in the



privacy of our homes or cabins on board, so it is not embarrassing, like asking for directions would be.

You don't lose points on your man card for doing this.

Going back to basics can be quite instructive. Are you doing the proper maintenance at the correct intervals? Are you using the correct lubricants? In the proper amounts? Is there a zinc you may have overlooked? Is there another filter in the system you missed? These items are often, and should be, found in the manuals for the systems onboard. Is there a test procedure to verify the system is working properly? What are the normal operating ranges for temperature, or pressure, or voltage?

No manuals? The infernal Internet is a rich source of information. Google has some uses besides wasting time. I have found the Facebook group for Bristol owners is a treasure trove of information on everything on these boats. Someone, somewhere has dealt with your system before and got some things right and some things wrong. If you can find that person and draw on their knowledge and experience, then you can avoid repeating mistakes. Ecclesiastes says "there is nothing new under the sun." Someone else has done this before, so learn from them.

There is a great deal of experience among the members of Nansemond River Power Squadron, and the members are willing to share it with you for the asking.

There are several courses available on basic engine maintenance and basic electricity. If there is interest in these courses, let me know and we will set it up.




time of the Boat Show. So a special thank you to all our members who filled in slots for the 3 days!

Safety Officer's Report

Five Winter Boating Safety Tips You Need To Know

Winter is still here, which

means the season for water recreation is just ahead. However, die-hard boaters and mariners often stay out on the water all year. This makes it important for these hobbyists to practice cold weather safety measures to ensure that they will make it home safe. Whether you are new to winter boating or a veteran, here are five tips to help keep you safe during the winter months:



- 1. Wear a Lifejacket Though this may seem like common sense, it becomes even more important in the winter. If a person falls into cold water, he or she has a limited amount of time to get the situation under control. The cold water can disorient and trigger a gasping reflex that could draw water into the lungs. Any device that helps you find your way to the surface can give you the precious seconds you need to survive. A properly fitted lifejacket is one of those critical timesaving devices.
- 2. Dress Properly Dressing for the cold air is what most people do in the winter, but do you also dress for the cold water? Bulky winter clothing and jackets can impede your movement in the water and weigh you down. This is especially dangerous since cold water can affect muscle movement and control. Clothing made of slimmer, waterproof materials that hold in heat can reduce this bulk and help you maneuver if you fall into the water.
- 3. **Have a Communications Device** Everyone has a cellphone and keeping it with you out on the water is a good idea. However, cellphones often become more unreliable the further from the

coast you get. A marine VHF radio and a GPS are more reliable, and the coast guard is always monitoring VHF channel 16 for distress calls. Keeping your devices in a Ziploc bag can also help ensure that water doesn't keep you from using them in an emergency.





4. **Maintain Your Vessel** – Winter can also affect the condition of your vessel. Lines and plumbing that are not properly flushed or plugged can crack if water freezes in them. This could cause your boat to take on water when you go out. Cold weather also drains batteries, so make sure you keep your battery on a trickle charger when docked and have an emergency jumper pack available.

AND ALWAYS REMEMBER...Don't Drink and Boat -

This final tip is valid for the entire year, but winter weather can multiply the danger. Drinking while boating can affect your reaction time and cloud your situational awareness. Any resulting accident could expose passengers or fellow mariners to hypothermia and


death. Don't boat or work under the influence of alcohol.

ABC Nansemond River Boating Experiences

Eek! Eels!

As a young teenager, I helped Quincy Backus on his 45' boat, the TIF-TER. The TIF-TER was converted to a motor yacht from a former USN Air Sea Rescue Boat. Quincy bought her around 1960. She is one of six identical boats built at the Norfolk Naval Shipyard in 1939. This boat had three eyelets built into the hull that were used to place her onboard a ship. She was designed that she could be dropped 50' into the water without damage. Powered by twin 12-cylinder Hall Scotts, she could attain a speed of 37 knots. She also carried two mounted anti-aircraft guns. Her mission was to get to a downed pilot. Being what this boat was, it did not



have sea scuppers at any of the raw water inlets. It did have big old bronze sea strainers for the engines, but not for the toilet.

This is where this story begins. Janey was a widow in her late 60's or maybe 70. She drove an old lime green Rambler station wagon with her little pooch. The station wagon was always packed and ready to go camping and/ or boating. Say the word, and she was ready. As you well know, heads on the smaller boats are not big and most used raw water to flush with back in the day. Well, one day Janey was using the head, while the owners were forward in the galley with friends, when they heard all this commotion aft. What was going on? Finally, the head door flies open and out comes Janey, (minus her drawers) screaming, "There is a snake in the toilet!" It was an eel that somehow managed to partially get in the toilet bowl, and it gave her quite the scare. No one wants to see an eel smiling up at you when you are taking care of business.

Going forward to 1970, after getting out of the Navy, I wound end up buying this boat to rebuild into a live-aboard (which I completed in 1972). There were things I did not know about big boats that I learned by personal

experience; this is one of those experiences. After I got the TIF-TER running again, I was dating Debbie. We planned a trip with other boating friends to Pungo Ferry Marina for Memorial Day weekend. We attended a wedding Saturday and did not get underway till about super time. Everything was going great till Murphy showed up on the starboard engine. It started running hot, and I had to shut it down. We were off the N&W coal piers. Lifting the engine hatch, I had a crewman start trouble shooting for a stoppage at the raw water intake. We found there was no strainer inside the strainer assembly but did have water. Next, we disconnected the inlet hose to the pump, no water. I told him to take the flashlight and see what is stopping up the hose. He looked with the flashlight and jumped back. "There are eyes looking me!" We had sucked up an eel. I told him to disconnect the hose at the strainer, get a broom handle, and push the eel out over the side. We are still underway with the port engine as this was going on in Norfolk Harbor. When he disconnected the hose that was beside his leg, the eel slipped out down his leg and into the bilge. It scared him so much, I believe he could have jumped from the bilge to the deck. We all got a big laugh out of that. By time we got to the Gilmerton Bridge, I got the engine back online.

The aircraft carrier captain saw a light...


"Tell the signalman to warn that boat to turn to port to avoid a collision."

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
