#### Marine Fire Extinguisher Technology



Since marine fire extinguishers were highlighted at the July training session, here is a question for you. Ever wonder why the agent of choice in marine portable fire extinguishers is dry chemical, a.k.a. Potassium Bicarbonate (PKP), Purple K Powder? Before I answer that, we need a quick firefighting review for clarity:

**Fire Definition**: A chemical reaction called combustion. A rapid oxidation of combustible material with a release of energy in the form of heat and light.

**Fire Tetrahedron**: (Not a triangle anymore) There are four sides to the fire tetrahedron:

- 1. Fuel side
- 2. Oxygen side
- 3. Heat side
- 4. Chemical chain reaction side

#### Marine Fire Extinguisher Technology (cont'd)

Removing one or more sides of the fire tetrahedron will cause the fire to be extinguished. Fire extinguisher agents work by breaking one or more of these sides.

Agents work by cooling, smothering, chain breaking and oxygen dilution:

- **1. Cooling-** reduces fuel source below its ignition point.
- **2. Smothering** Separates the fuel source from the oxygen supply
- 3. Chain breaking- Disrupts an element of the chain in a chemical process.
- **4. Oxygen dilution** Reduces the amount of oxygen to a level below that needed to sustain combustion.

Agents selected depends on the Class of fire. Remember these?

**Class A** Common combustible materials such as wood, paper, cloth, rubber and plastics (also fiberglass).

- **Class B** Flammable liquids and gases, grease, petroleum products or similar items.
- **Class C** Energized electrical equipment, conductors or appliances.
- **Class D** Combustible metals such as sodium, potassium, magnesium and titanium.

So, why do recreational boaters use dry chemical extinguishers? It is because dry chemical agent is very versatile and can be used on Class A, Class B and Class C fires.

Class A Removes the heat side

Class B Removes the oxygen side

Class C Removes the oxygen and heat sides.

#### Marine Fire Extinguisher Technology (cont'd)

This is why most marine fire extinguishers will be marked as ABC on the label.

Here are a few advantages of using dry chemical agent:

- · Ingredients are generally non-toxic but can affect lungs (see below)
- · Forms a cloud that limits heat for combustion
- · Breaks the flame combustion chain
- Most effective on Class B fires (burning liquids)

However, there are some disadvantages:

- Can cause alkaline burns to the lungs if persistently inhaled.
- · Lingering hot spots have to be monitored for flare-ups.
- Agent leaves a messy and corrosive residue especially on electronic equipment.

As a final takeaway, always have adequate numbers of fire extinguishers onboard (not just the USCG minimum). Remember, "*You can never have too many fire extinguishers when you are on fire.*" Not enough room for more fire extinguishers? Try increasing the size for more capacity. And, although not required, mount your fire extinguishers in a place where they are readily accessible.

## In the Morning and Evening Sky

The full moon on August 1 and on August 30 are called supermoons due to the closeness of the moon and the apparent larger diameter. The full moon on August 30 is also called a blue moon since it is the second full moon in the calendar month.

Venus and Jupiter have both dropped into the solar glare, ending their lengthy reigns as evening stars. Venus reappears in the morning sky by late August. Jupiter reappears at sunset in early November.

The great Perseid Meteor Shower will have excellent dark sky viewing conditions on August 11 ,12 and 13, since the peak is close to the new Moon (i.e., no moonlight to interfere!). The Perseids deliver a meteor a minute in dark cloudless skies. These shooting stars are best seen after midnight.

August 18 – The crescent moon and Mars appear close and low in the west evening sky. This will be the last time we see Mars until the second week of January 2024, low in the morning sky. .for a while

August 20 - Venus becomes the morning star.

August 27 - Saturn arrives at opposition, its brightest of the year, about as bright as a moderately bright star in the Big Dipper. Saturn now rises at sunset and remains out all night.

August 28: Venus, having just moved from an evening to a morning star has now brightened to a dazzling magnitude.



#### What is a Vessel Safety Check (VSC)?

A Vessel Safety Check is a courtesy examination of your boat (Vessel) to verify the presence and condition of certain Safety Equipment required by State and the Federal regulations. The Vessel Examiner is a trained specialist and is a member of the United States Power Squadrons or the US Coast Guard Auxiliary. They will also make certain recommendations and discuss certain safety issues that will make you a safer boater.

Our Squadron has two new certified Safety Examiners, Jim Juritsch and Bill Simpson. As of the end of July, our Squadron has performed 61 safety inspections in 2023! That's 61 touch points with the public to validate their onboard safety equipment, along with important remediation actions for those who did not pass. Our other Vessel Safety Examiners are Ernie Burnett, Mike Jezierski, Jim Zeigler and Dave Teets.

Every interaction is an opportunity to validate required federal and state safety equipment, to promote safe boating and make a recruiting contact for our club.



#### The Summer Triangle

The Summer Triangle of Vega, Altair and Deneb shines bright and high in the summer evening sky! Just look to the East and up! It is considered an asterism, which is a geographical grouping of stars and a more general concept than the 88 constellations.

Vega climbs from the east and is directly overhead at sunset on the fall Equinox. Of the three, it is highest on the sky in the late summer evening. Deneb is lower and to the north and Altair, even lower and to the south. The Summer Triangle climbs in the sky all summer nigh longt.

If you're lucky enough to be under a dark starry sky on a moonless night, you'll see the great swath of stars passing between the Summer Triangle's Vega and Altair. The star Deneb bobs in the middle of this river of stars, which arcs across dark summer skies. This sky river is, of course, the edgewise view into our own Milky Way galaxy.

#### 2023 Tropical Cyclone Forecast Revised Upwards

Colorado State University, Accuweather and The Weather Company have all revised their forecasts for this hurricane season. They predict a higher number of storms due to record warmer ocean water temperatures in the tropical Atlantic> This is expected to counteract the El Niño conditions that usually diminish Atlantic tropical storm activity.
