Commander's Message

I went down to the dock the other day to check on the boat.

It was 28 degrees (Fahrenheit). Bundled up, I was met with a brisk Northern breeze, yielding an 18° F wind chill. Brrrr! Down the dock I ventured, watching my footing. The dock boards were dry as any ice had long since sublimated in the wind. I noted a floating ice sheet along the shore, braced by the shore-line's riprap and jostled by the wind, piling up thin sheets of crystals as the wavelets danced by. The water was very clear, (by Bay standards), the bottom visible to three to four feet deep.

Down the dock I hustled, hitting the lift control's power, and then the "down" button. I was just a bit relieved as the four lift motors came to life. Slowly, so slowly, the cable drums unwound--too slowly I thought as the wind began to penetrate both my down jacket and the scarf around my neck. "Why couldn't this wait until next week?" I asked myself. No logical answer materialized. "It's been two months since I've been on the boat." I convinced myself of the necessary nature of my visit.

"I need to check the dock power and make sure the battery chargers are keeping the battery banks topped off. I don't want to find out next month (or week) that they've discharged because, for some unknown reason, the shore power breaker had tripped." Again, reinforcing my somewhat ill-conceived decision to venture down the dock. (Ignoring the fact that, in 10 years, I have never had an unexpected breaker trip here on the dock.)

As the swim step lined up with the dock, I stopped the lift. Brrr! Stepping gingerly, eyeing the icy water below, across the swim platform, I checked the cockpit cover snaps, and noted a few had come loose. "High winds last week must have dislodged these," I figured, noting which snaps will need to be firmly closed when I am done.

Holding on carefully (remember the icy water below) I unsnapped the cover from the starboard side of the transom, opened the transom gate and stepped into the cockpit with a bit of relief, now securely aboard. "Everything looks ship-shape here," I noted, stepping up to the bridge deck.

Sliding the companionway door aside, I stepped down into the cabin and checked the breaker panel. "Great!" I thought, "power's still on." I switched each battery bank to the voltage meter, noting all three banks were well over 12 volts. "Check!"

A quick survey of the rest of the panel confirmed the correct lay-up breaker alignment--everything looked good. A brief glance around the cabin showed nothing of concern. I headed back up to the bridge deck, closed the companionway door behind me and headed toward the stern. Again, onto the swim platform, zipping and snapping the canvas as I departed, carefully re-seating all the recalcitrant snaps. "This canvas doesn't stretch as much at 28 degrees as it did at 68 degrees," I thought to myself.

Back on the dock, I lean over to check the running gear and the shaft zinc. "Looks good," I thought.

Part way up the dock, I switched the lift on again and hit "UP." The cable drums came to life, this time hefting the boat's 25,000 lbs. up, out of harm's way. Brrr! I turned my collar up and tucked my scarf inside the jacket again and turned my back to the wind. Slowly, oh so slowly, the boat raised up, rocked by a sudden wind gust, but swinging only gently in the cradle. It finally reached the upper limit switch and shut off. I quickly shut down the lift control's power, closed and latched the cover and hustled back up the dock.

More ice had piled up on the north side of the dock, against that shoreline. The wind was picking up a bit, I figured, taking quick strides. Finally, on solid land, I glanced back down the dock, satisfied that I had fulfilled my mission as caretaker of this worthy craft. Across the yard, and through the back gate, I gained elevation to the back deck, and was greeted by two happy German Shepherds, tails wagging, engaged in spirited play. Up the steps, and back into the kitchen door I trounced. "Brrr!" I announced, as I peeled off my overcoat and scarf. "It's cold out there!"

"Where have you been?" she asked.

Vessel Safety Checks (VSC)

Vessel Safety Checks are a great benefit the squadron performs for the general boating community. The VSC program is regulated by the USCG and performed by USPS and our partner, the USCG Auxiliary.

Each VSC Examiner is required to attend a designated training session, successfully complete a written exam and perform an evaluation in the field. RSPS currently has four examiners with another coming onboard by spring. Dave Teets is the VSC Committee Chair. Dave sets the goals and plans for the VSC annual program. He also provides examiner training and logistical support for the examiners. Last year RSPS performed 94 VSCs and has set a goal of 120+ VSCs for 2024.

Enrollment is open for **America's Boating Course**, held on Saturday, March 2nd and 16th. New for this year, we are partnering with Chesterfield County Parks & Recreation and teaching the course at their facility. They are also overseeing enrollment. Enrollment is open for the **Marine Navigation** course. Marine Navigation covers the basics of coastal and inland navigation. This course focuses on navigation as it is done on recreational boats today and embraces GPS as a primary navigation tool while





The course will utilize OpenCPN navigation software that turns your PC into a chartplotter and provides free access to NOAA nautical charts. That software runs on all platforms including Apple MacIntosh except Apple IOS (iPad and iPhones).





Time to Start Thinking about Spring.

Well, Punxsutawney Phil did not see his shadow this February 2, so we should expect an early spring. Having grown up in Western Pennsylvania, I can tell you that Phil and his ancestors have always been right.

This is a good time to check your "dated" safety equipment. Starting last year, portable, disposable fire extinguishers have a 12 year shelf life. If they are approved marine grade fire extinguishers, look



for a date on the label or stamped in the bottom. Don't forget your jet ski.

Likewise, check your flares. If you have invested in one of the new strobe flares, check the batteries and make sure you have the daytime flag within the unit.

First aid kits are often overlooked. What are the conditions of the bandages? If you have a bottle of hydrogen peroxide on board, it should be replaced yearly. Same with antibiotic cream and liquid skin. They do not last as long when stored in variable temperature conditions. Also, a good time to check your sunscreen, bug spray and anti-itch medicines.

How is your spare parts supply? Fan belts, cooling system impellors, and extra oil are important to have on board. Do you have enough oil on board in case your oil pan plug, oil filter or oil line detach while you are on the water? What about oil absorbing pads in case you do have an oil leak?

Have you replaced your zinc (sacrificial anodes) and checked your spares?

The boat yards will be getting busy as soon as the weather warms – have you scheduled to haul out?



In the Night Sky

February 2024

Moon Almanac

Last Quarter New Moon First Quarter Full Moon
February 3 February 10 February 17 February 24

"Snow Moon"

Jupiter starts out each night high in the southern sky at twilight falling. These moons are visible with binoculars and telescope and the image changes each night as the moon orbits about this large planet.

Saturn will be visible 45 minutes after sunset on Feb. 1, when it stands 12° high in the west. It is lost in twilight after the second week of the month. Your last view may be Feb. 10, when a the Moon stands just over 2° south of Saturn. The pair is 6° high 30 minutes after sunset and drops below the horizon about half an hour later. Saturn shines at magnitude 0.9 and can be spotted easily with binoculars.

Saturn is low at twilight and will be hard to see later in the month.

Uranus and **Neptune** are visible all evening with binoculars or telescopes, at the same angle but east of Jupiter. Uranus will be slightly south of the 1st quarter moon on February 15. Look for a bluish dot.

Mars, Venus and Mercury are all visible in the southeast in the early morning before sunrise. They start out the month very close together. Mars and Mercury will be closest and Venus about 3 times further away. Find very bright Venus near the morning horizon and then look for red Mars. Mercury disappears early in the month. Venus continues to get closer to the morning horizon while Mars continues to climb. It will be more visible in the next few months.

Meteors are rare in February, with no major showers.
