This year's Fall Educational Conference will be held 22-24 November at the gorgeous Hyatt Regency Chesapeake Bay in Cambridge, MD. This resort is situated on the Choptank River and boasts a 150 slip marina, 18 hole golf course, tennis courts, a massive glass-enclosed heated pool, and a world class full-service spa. In addition to these features, there are three restaurants on site to give you a multitude of dining options. Starting on 22 November is "Oyster Week at the Hyatt," where they will be showcasing oyster tastings and wine pairings, oyster menu specials, and cooking demonstrations. The Hyatt also offers activities for children, including a game room and a lifesized chess board. At night, you can make s'mores at the outside fireplace to warm yourself up.

If that isn't enough, there are lots of activities to do in the surrounding area. Downtown Cambridge is filled with locally owned restaurants and shops where you can get a head start on holiday shopping. While in Cambridge, you can visit the Choptank River Lighthouse, Skipjack Nathan of Dorchester, Richardson Maritime Museum, Historic Downtown Cambridge tours, Dorchester Heritage Museum, and the Harriet Tubman Museum and Educational Center. Dorchester County is also home to Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge, a 27,000-acre refuge that is home to one of the largest populations of bald eagles on the East Coast. Also located in Dorchester County are Layton's Chance Winery and Breckenridge Farms, which operates a corn maze (weather permitting).

As a special incentive to arrive early, there will be a murder mystery dinner at a local restaurant on Thursday, 21 November. Please sign up early for this event as seating is limited. DISTRICT 5 WINTER TRAINING SESSION

The 2014 D/5 Winter Training Session (WTS) will be held 14-16 February 2014 at the Maritime Institute in Linthicum Heights, MD centrally located in District 5. This event provides updated Officer Training, Leadership Development, Team Building, District and Departmental Showcases built from and improving upon the 2013 offerings. New for 2014 is a special session for outgoing Squadron Commanders.

WTS was created in response to two concerns voiced by Members: 1) having to take a day off work for officer training; and 2) getting trained too late in the year.

All incoming Squadron Bridge Officers, Executive Committee Members, and Squadron leaders in other key roles (e.g., Membership, VSCs, Communications), plus current Commanders, should attend WTS.

The schedule will allow those who don't wish to stay overnight to attend just for Saturday 15 February. But for those who do stay over, there will be Friday and Saturday networking cocktail receptions, buffet dinners catered by award-winning chefs, and entertainment – including a special Valentine's Day event on Friday evening. The Maritime Institute's cuisine truly is excellent.


District 5 Summer Cruise

The Southbound Cruise for District 5 started at Herrington North with 11 boats. There was an outstanding dock party, and even though the dock was narrow no one fell into the water. We had a little rain, but our spirits were not dampened at all.

The next day we left for the Solomons and all docked at the large floating dock at the Calvert Marina, which put all the boats together. Another dock party was held where members enjoyed great friendship.

The Cruise left early the next morning for Point Lookout Marina, which was an in-between stop from the Solomons to the Tides on the Rappahannock River. For all the boats the trip was uneventful. At Point Lookout, the restaurant opened especially for us, and most if not all the cruisers took part in eating there. The food was good, but the company was even better.

In looking at the weather on the Bay, leaving Point Lookout did not look bad, but when the boats got out there, it was not as advertised by the Weather Channel. The forecast told us it would be 3 footers on the Bay, but when we got out there we faced 6 footers with a little larger ones every once in a while. To make it worse, our course went right into the "teeth" of the waves which did not allow for any type of speed. Some boats went to the lee of the land mass, others plowed onward, one went behind a bigger boat and let them cut the waves down, and some turned back to Point Look-



out. Not only was it very windy, but the rain came down in buckets which made visibility low. Docking in the wind would have made excellent videos as USPS® members showed how well we handle our vessels. The dock master thought he would have some cheap entertainment, but he was disappointed as all Captains and crews did an outstanding job. As able bodied sea people of USPS®, most made it to the Tides where we all had a good time playing golf or riding bicycles.

After two days, or in some cases one day, we went across the Bay to Cape Charles for the Summer Rendezvous. It was a little rough but nothing compared to the trip from Point Lookout. All boats made the trip without any problems. The Summer Rendezvous with District 27 was excellent, and so were the three days we spent at Kings Creek.

Our next stop was Somers Cove in Crisfield, and we were happy to have great weather there. The next day some boats went up the Nanticoke River and some went back to Calvert. After two days in Calvert we traveled to Tilghman Island, and again it was a little rough but again not bad. Two days at Tilghman on the Chesapeake was great. Eating at Harrisons is always a treat. We then all went our own way home.

All in all we had 15 boats at different times for the Cruise. This speaks volumes about how active District 5 is and how the members support the D/5 activities.

Circumnavigating the Delmarva Peninsula Stf/C Alan Karpas, SN



The sailing vessels Hideaway, skippered by Stf/C Alan Karpas, JN and Event Horizon skippered by P/D/C Jeff McKinney, JN, sailed around the Delmarva Peninsula in route to the D/5 Summer Rendezvous. The crew on Hideaway included National BOC Chairman, R/C Chris Windeler, SN, and Rockville members; Neal White, S and Patricia Peter, AP. Event Horizon's crew included Rockville members P/C Jon Van Winkle, SN, Paul Ostrye, JN and Jon Griffin, JN.

The crews for the trip met at Maryland Yacht Club on Sunday 4 August for a crew meeting to review the course and establish communication and safety procedures. The cruise started at 0500 on Monday 5 August. The first leg of 55 nautical miles took them up the Bay and through the C&D Canal. They arrived at the Delaware City Marina in Delaware City at 1600. The narrow entrance to the Delaware City Marina, with a current of 2 knots, provided

their first real interesting experience. Due to the narrow channel, they could not turn around and had to dock with the current. Once at dock, the experienced marina crew turned them around so they could leave in the morning. After a great dinner at a local pub they all got a good night's sleep in preparation for another early departure on Tuesday.

As planned, the two boats got underway at 0500 with the help of the dock master. After squeezing out of very tight slips, they headed for the Delaware River and the Delaware Bay. Using good piloting practices, the crews kept a log of the trip, plotting their position every hour. Since Hideaway was equipped with radar, a chart plotter, a navigation computer and Class "B" AIS, she lead the way keeping Event Horizon informed of concerning traffic. This 193 nautical miles, 36 hour leg of the trip took the boats south in the Atlantic Ocean before turning north into the Chesapeake Bay to the Kings

Creek Marina. Since they were sailing nonstop, the boat captains set up watches so that no one person would be at the helm alone. A minimum of two crew members were standing watch at all times. When possible, they sailed but, when due to wind (or the lack of it), it became impossible to maintain a positive VMG toward their waypoints, they went under power. Entering Kings Creek was another challenge as the water in the creek is very shallow. Since they were arriving at low tide and anticipating a problem with the thin water, Alan made arrangements with the dock master at Kings Creek Marina to call him when they were within range of the creek. The dock master came out to meet them and guided them into the marina. The guide boat had a 10' pole that they used to check the depths as Hideaway and Event Horizon followed their lead. They took a couple of green buoys to starboard as they were lead safely into the marina. Local knowledge was absolutely required to get in to the harbor.



For those of you who have never sailed overnight in the ocean, it is quite different than in the Bay. There are no land targets and very few lights. You must watch your charts and compass to maintain your course. Each hour they consulted their paper charts and plotted their position to double check their progress.

The return trip started on Sunday at 1200 at high tide! This 126 nautical mile leg was an overnight sail up the Bay. The challenges cruising overnight on the Bay are significantly different than in the open ocean. Lights are everywhere! At night, the watches were particularly observant to assure they were heading to the appropriate mark. Commercial vessels were frequent targets. The AIS proved to be a very helpful tool to identify the commercial vessels and allowed for good communications with them to discuss passing or meeting procedures. Unfortunately, the wind from the south did not allow them to sail as much as they would have liked and had to motor most of the way north. The two vessels arrived back at the Maryland Yacht Club at 0830 on 12 August.

The experience was a lot of fun and provided a valuable education for the crews of both boats. If there are members who would like to make this trip next year, Alan said he would be happy to lead it again. D/5 could make circumnavigating the Delmarva an annual event.

2013 D/5& D/27 NAVIGATION CONTEST

The 2013 Navigation Contest was held on Saturday, 10 August, under fair skies and lovely weather. Five boats participated, four from Dundalk Sail & Power Squadron and one new entrant from Virginia Beach Sail & Power Squadron.

Proving that new participants can handle the load, "Following Z's," of Virginia Beach, skippered by P/C Dick Zahn, AP with Joe Bradley and Graham Fox navigating, came in first place with the shortest elapsed time variance, followed by "Rat Ark," "Battle Wagon," "Jenny Lynn Too," and "After Hours II," all of Dundalk, in that order of elapsed time variance.

Many thanks are extended to D/1st/Lt Joe Gibson, AP for providing the committee boat and to P/D/C Brian Becker, AP, and D/Lt Rhoda Shralow, S, for crewing the committee boat and keeping the records of the competition. Thanks also to D/Lt John Wilmot, JN, for providing the review boat. It is an inspiring part of the tradition surrounding the navigation contest to have the boats that have completed the course pass in review and be saluted by, and in turn salute to, the entire district bridge, all in uniform and arrayed along the deck of the review boat. Our thanks also to the volunteers who acted as observers on each of the entrant boats.

As the winning boat and a novice entry, "Following Z's" captured a truckload of trophies, including the DuPont Trophy as the first place boat, and the Robert E. Hale Award for the novice boat having the lowest finish time error. Virginia Beach SPS won the Commander's Trophy and the WJZ-TV Award as the squadron with the lowest finish time error. P/C Dick Zahn, AP, helmsman of "Following Z's" and a member of Old Point Comfort Yacht Club, won the CBYCA Trophy.

"Sour Puss" was retained by Dundalk SPS.

The contest was run this year under revised rules that allowed the crews of the boats entered in the contest to plot their courses a day in advance of running the course, and permitted GPS readings of latitude and longitude throughout the run. These changes were designed to remove the pressures on navigators to plot their courses in a short interval immediately before the start of the contest, and to make the event a learning experience in which the skills learned in the Boating, Piloting and Advanced Piloting courses are applied with whatever assistance is needed from the course materials and other members of the boat's squadron. From the comments received after the contest, these changes were greeted with approval by all.

As in past years, all of the participants, boats, crews, observers, committee members and bridge members expressed pleasure at the experience of participating in an ongoing tradition of D/5, joined now by D/27. We hope that more boats will be encouraged to participate next year and join in the delight navigating the waters of Chesapeake Bay.

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Cooperative Charting

The Cooperative Charting year began on 1 April and ends next 31 March. We are therefore approximately one-third of the way into another year. With two or three months remaining in the boating season of good cruising weather, there is still time to participate in USPS® Cooperative Charting program.

Using the Internet you can find the latest updated edition of the Cooperative Charting Manual available online at http://www.usps.org/national/coch/. In the manual you'll find a number of non-technical programs available in which to choose. See which program best suits your interests. All reports must be made using Cooperative Charting Website (CCWWB). To get full credit all reports must be submitted within four weeks of the investigation date.

There has been much talk over the years about restarting the very popular Geodetic Recovery program. At the Governing Board meeting earlier this month, this subject was discussed in the Coop Charting Committee. Details have to be worked out with NOAA National Geodetic Survey office and approved by USPS®. Look for more information on this at the 100th Anniversary Annual Meeting in Jacksonville beginning in late January 2014.

FIFTY YEARS OF COOPERATIVE CHARTING

In addition to this being the 100th anniversary of USPS®, it is also the 50th anniversary of the Cooperative Charting program. The agreement of cooperation between NOAA's Office of the Coast Survey and USPS® makes our cooperative charting program possible. It was first signed in 1963 and has been continuously renewed, most recently by Rear Admiral Glang and Chief Commander Alter at the annual meeting in 2013.



To commemorate this anniversary year, D/5 will be awarding a special 50th year patch to the top 75 participants in the program and adding a "50 Years of Cooperative Charting" citation to their award certificates. This will be for the charting year 4/01/2013 to 3/31/2014. The awards will be mailed to the Districts for presentation at the fall 2014 district Conferences. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity, so plan now to chart early and chart often in the upcoming year.

The 2014 NOAA-USPS® Cooperative Charting workshop will be held at the Atlantic Marine Center in Norfolk, Va., from 2 to 3 May.

The workshop covers planning, data gathering requirements, data collection and report submission using **CCWeb**, the Cooperative Charting website.

The traditional Cooperative Charting activities includes small-craft facility updates as well as updates to Coast Pilot books, nautical charts and small-craft charts. The workshop emphasizes the ease of entering reports into CCWeb.

The workshop also has hands-on experience using DepthWiz and entering data into CCWeb. The DepthWiz track includes planning a route, running the route in a boat (weather permitting), recording the data and preparing the data for submission using CCWeb.

Participants will meet on Friday evening at the Governor Dinwiddie Hotel in Portsmouth for an informal welcome reception. On Saturday, coffee and donuts will be provided at the Atlantic Marine Center. The workshop closes on Saturday evening with a dinner at the hotel featuring a guest speaker.


