2020 D/5 Summer Cruise & Council Cancelled

This is truly disappointing news to report. The year's ABC Mid-Atlantic Summer Cruise and Council at Smith Mountain Lake has fallen victim to the Covid-19 virus.

Although Virginia has begun to loosen restrictions in most of the state, further actions to allow group events are contingent on continued reductions in infection rates. With this uncertainty and out of a prudent concern for the wellbeing of our membership, this summer's event has been cancelled.

Members should cancel any boat or lodging reservations in time to recover deposits. Parrot Cove provides full refunds on cancellations made 30 days prior to rental. Mariners Landing is a bit more lenient on room deposits. We recommend making cancellations soon as possible to reduce any unforeseen complications.

America's Boating Club – Smith Mountain Lake was very much looking forward to hosting this 2020 event and regret the cancellation. The squadron is taking a pause as the various arrangements and commitments are undone. The possibility of rescheduling the event at Smith Mountain Lake in 2021 is under review.

Comunamder's Message

There were glitches, as there are even in face-to-face ceremonies, but everyone pitched in with tolerance and patience. I even surprised myself using this technology. Since that District Change of Watch, District 5 and many D/5 squadrons have continued to increase their use of technology to move forward. Take this time to reflect on why you value your USPS membership. Why did you join? I joined because I wanted to take an engine maintenance class. I made some good friends in that class so I joined the squadron. Why do you stay in USPS? I stay because of the close friendships I have made and because I'm passionate about USPS's honorable missions of boating safety and civic service. Discuss with your squadron members what they value about their membership. How can your squadron improve the return on your membership dollars?

Please stay safe out there. This virus is no joke. Politics aside, until there is a vaccine or we reach 70 percent immunity in our population, we will all be in serious danger. We cannot control the ignorance or insubordination of others, but we can control ourselves. This is a challenge won by personal defense and patience. Never let your guard down, even for a second. We're also involved in other activities. Some members are sewing masks and donating them to different groups. We are conducting 2 classes virtually –Marine Navigation (Piloting) and Radar. The approximately 30-minute session opened with a short America's Boating Channel video clip focused on anchoring. This was followed by a lively discussion of the techniques shown in the video and the personal experience of those attending. These sessions will be held approximately once a month. The squadron is preparing to offer an online Navigation course in the spring and an online Piloting course in the fall. The squadron's educational officer has been working with the national USPS organization to convert the four navigation courses (Piloting, Advanced Piloting, Junior Navigation, Navigation) into e-book format. This process should be completed in the next week or two. This is necessary to provide the course materials to the student because the USPS National Head-quarters has not been able to ship paper copies of the course materials. We will continue to look into virtual ways to keep our members involved.

NANSEMOND RIVER

Nansemond River Power Squadron started using Zoom for meetings and to stay in touch with our members. We started with three members of the Bridge to see how it worked. The second test was with the full Bridge which led to setting up our first Bridge meeting which was held online with ten of us. Another thing that we did was an old fashioned phone tree, dividing our membership among the Bridge and reaching out to all members. One of the things discussed as we talked with our members was using Zoom as a way to stay connected as a squadron. We did a follow up email with instructions on how to set up Zoom. We did our first squadron Zoom online meeting on Wednesday 22 April with twenty-seven members joining in, including two of our members who are currently living in Italy. Based on our success in April, we have scheduled our May meetings using Zoom and are hopeful that more members will join in. We are also planning some interval training so we can all stay sharp. Mark your calendars now for the 2020 D/5 Fall Conference to be held at the Wyndham Gettysburg in historic Gettysburg, PA. Along with the spectacular workshops and seminars, there will be a Ladies Tea & 1863 Fashion Luncheon. Gettysburg has much to offer:

Gettysburg National Military Park Museum

The new National Park Visitor Center museum houses an enormous collection of artifacts from the Battle of Gettysburg. There is an entrance fee to the museum. You can also arrange for a personal tour of the Battlefield with a licensed Battlefield Guide.



This is President Eisenhower's home. The tour leaves from the National Park Visitor Center and takes about an hour.

David Wills House

This museum is dedicated to Lincoln's visit to Gettysburg and the Gettysburg Address.

The Shriver House Museum

The historic home in downtown Gettysburg is focused on interpreting the civilian experience. The home is furnished as if the Shriver family still lived there. The home was occupied by the Confederates during the battle. You can even see the holes where the sharpshooters knocked out bricks to shoot onto the street below.

Seminary Ridge Museum

Seminary Ridge Museum, located on Seminary Ridge, has three floors of exhibits that explore the dilemmas that shaped the Civil War, the first day of the Battle of Gettysburg, and the Seminary's role as a Civil War field hospital.

The museum also offers tours of the building's cupola, where Brigadier General John Buford stood as he plotted troop movements on the first day of the battle.

Gettysburg Heritage Museum

Utilizing artifacts, historical documents, interactive displays and 3-D productions, visitors will gain a better understanding of the events that took place in the town before, during and after the battle. Find out how people reacted to the invasion of the town; freeze, flee or fight? Hear accounts of ordinary people doing extraordinary things in a time when their home was in turmoil.

A Legacy of Education

Honoring the Charles F. Chapman Award for Excellence in Teaching Winners for 2019.

According to Charles F. Chapman, a past chief commander and one of our founding fathers, United States Power Squadrons was founded to prove that small motorboats with educated captains deserve a place in our nation's waterways.

In a 1972 interview in The Ensign magazine, Chap said that the board of steamboat inspectors who governed navigation in 1914 was a group of "very old seagoing men" who "had no use for small internal combustion-powered craft."

United States Power Squadrons was formed, he said, to instruct members on the rudiments of boat handling and remove one objection the board had to these small craft.

Every year we honor Chap's legacy and the mission of United States Power Squadrons with the Charles F. Chapman Award for Excellence in Teaching.

During the 2020 Annual Meeting in Ponte Vedra Beach. Florida, three instructors, Jim Ziegler, David Smith and Gar Mondarino, received the 2019 Charles F. Chapman Award for Excellence in Teaching. This portion of the article will highlight Jim Ziegler, who is a member of Richmond Sail and Power Squadron in District 5.

Much of Jim's teaching is directed toward new members of the squadron. He teaches at least one Seamanship (Boat Handling) and one Piloting class back to back early in the fall. He concludes these classed with an on-the-water training session on his vessel. A proponent of on-the-water training, Jim also helped create and regularly teaches the squadron's Boater's Boot Camp, which provides new boaters one day of classroom instruction followed by one day of on-the-water training.

Michael Silvay, a fellow instructor who took Weather under Jim, writes that he made each topic crystal clear before moving on, ensuring that the class had a good understanding of the complex material. "I am a boating instructor and an experienced captain, Michael writes, "but I still consider Jim Ziegler a mentor and a 'go-to-guy' when it comes to any boating questions."

Fellow instructor Dave Childress says Jim's friendly, open demeanor and encouragement makes him a popular instructor who is responsible for many students joining the squadron. "Underway, Jim has graciously allowed students to pilot and steer his trawler *Tortuga*," Dave writes, "invariably encouraging them to 'come try it,' with the results of porducting more active members of our boating community."

Junior Navigation student David Duros had trouble mastering sextant operation, so he asked Jim for help after a squadron meeting. "Jim was able to find the flaw in my technique quickly and demonstrate the correct way, " which Duros writes, turned a difficulity into an ability.

Many members recounted how Jim created a nautical-themed "Jeopardy!" game for a District 5 Spring Conference, complete with lights, buzzers and enthusiastic audience participation.

When asked what advice he'd give other instructors, Jim said, "Be honest with your students. If it's your first time teaching a course, let them know. Your job as a teacher is to guide your students through the material. You do not have to be the smartest person in the room, but the one with the logical path to build the knowledge."

Jim says, "For me the most rewarding part of teaching comes from seeing the students apply what they have learned and have a more enjoyable time on the water."



America's Boating Channel Responds to COVID-19

AMERICA'S BOATING CHANNEL America's Boating Chanel responded to the COVID-19 pandemic in three ways -- suspending its US Sailing Team Olympics countdown, changing its Season Four video launch plans, and adding America's Boating Channel

> With the Tokyo Summer Games postponed a year, America's Boating Channel agreed to postpone its ongoing promotional campaign until

next February. America's Boating Channel's final 2020 sailing team video played at the end of March and was followed by the last few Season Three pull-outs (short segments derived from full-length videos) and then the introduction of original new boating safety and boater education titles from Season Four to roll-out through early September.





On March 30, the Coast Guard authorized a special project to help boaters cope with sheltering in place against the pandemic by providing a weekly online magazine show for boaters by boaters. America's Boating Channel's initial commitment was to produce a flight of six pilot shows beginning on April 8 with the potential to continue each week for as long as boaters have to shelter in place.

The project was given the simplest of names -- America's Boating Channel LIVE -- to avoid brand dilution. Each Wednesday at 4:00 PM Eastern Time, a new episode of America's Boat-

ing Channel LIVE is simulcast on its YouTube Channel and primary website AmericasBoatingChannel.com.

The project relies on volunteer participation, and there are five ways to get involved: come up with segment concepts, recruit participants, capture visuals - a video show demands an enormous amount of visual material, record voiceovers, or help with marketing.

LIVE. Segment contributors include Megan Humphrey for "Nautical Crafts," John O'Reilly for "Boating Motion Pictures," Holly Tompkins for "Boating Music," Chuck Wells for "Books for Boaters," and Jim Zeigler for "Boating TV Programs."

Some of the other areas being covered are preparing vessels to get back on the water, reminiscing about past cruises, recreational boat simulations, physical and mental health during quarantines, and online boater education.

Above all, experienced boating story tellers are needed along with diversity in the people and perspectives represented on the show.

Record Voiceovers

A mix of male and female voices are also required, and again training and assistance are provided for voiceovers—typically recording narration right over the phone.
