Education Department Bill Barber



Since several members successfully completed Piloting (Marine Navigation) this past spring, we plan to offer Advanced Piloting (Advanced Marine Navigation) as a logical follow up course this winter. This course is NOT limited to those that just completed Piloting Piloting. If you completed Piloting at any time in the past, you are welcome and encouraged to join us to learn the important material in the Advanced Piloting (AP) course.

Randy Williamson has generously offered to be the lead instructor for the AP course and I'll be handling the homework reviews, like we did last spring for the Piloting class. Randy and I are currently working on a class schedule, which will start no later than the beginning of January. We are also working with our education officer colleagues in other squadrons to ensure that we have the most current presentation materials, since the navigation tools (and presentation materials) available to us all improve every year.



How to Begin to Prepare for a Hurricane

I thought it might be interesting to see how we prepare for a hurricane. When you live in the lower mid Atlantic states your peak risk time is mid August to the end of September. We begin to watch weather patterns near the end of July.

Weather patterns are a very important indication of severity of storms. If a hurricane comes to us via the Gulf of Mexico (slides up the coast), then our chances of flooding are decreased because of the angle to the land. If a hurricane is perpendicular to our shore, then the surge and flooding will be much greater. We live about 45 miles inland from the ocean on Pamlico Sound. The critical factor for a storm is how fast it is moving. If it is moving slowly, then we will have much more flooding because the water is pushed further inland and ahead of the hurricane.

Where it makes landfall is very important also. The closer to us for landfall means less time in the Northeast quadrant of the storm and that means less wind velocity and flooding. The most damage from a hurricane occurs ahead of the storm and near the eye of the hurricane.

Boat Prep: So how do we begin to prepare for a hurricane? For many years we had a sailboat at our dock so that is always the first prep area. We take off all the sails and everything that could get caught in high winds or add any windage to the boat. We then center the boat in the slip and have two sets of lines, one high on the post and one on the cleats on the dock. Since we live on an isolated creek we are also able to put out an anchor off the bow and one to the NE for additional holding area.

Our dock lies to the NE so we know that the most serious wind and waves will come from that direction. We use chafing gear on all lines as well as fender boards, fenders and lines that are ½" diameter. If the lines are too big then the tie on the cleat is compromised. We have a rule that when the water (or waves) starts to come over the dock we don't go out on the dock anymore until the storm is over. You can imagine the worry and apprehension of that decision. Also, most hurricanes tend to come at night in the dark. The noise of the wind and rain in the dark is terrifying. Boat prep takes about two days.

We have only evacuated for one storm and that was Florence in 2018. That hurricane stayed for 3 days and did excessive damage. We would not evacuate again as we are well prepared for a hurricane here at home and it is harder to be somewhere else and wondering what is going on at home. A fast moving storm will exit the area quickly and the flood waters will recede within a few hours. A slow moving storm could take days for the water to recede. The backside of a hurricane is like someone pulls a plug and a lot of water goes back out of the creek quickly. Anything that breaks lose in a hurricane will flow back out as the water recedes and cause more damage.

House prep: Now it is time to get the house ready for the storm. We have hurricane shutters for all 32 windows but we don't always put them all up. By now we are constantly watching the weather and have fairly good idea of its direction and how fast it is moving. That information determines our degree of preparation. Wave action from the NE is a serious issue. We have large panels of plywood that we put over doors that go under the house to protect the doors from wave action.

Everything that can be water damaged has to be moved to higher ground. That is when we realize how much junk we have collected and put under the house!!! Cars and trailers have to be moved out of the neighborhood to higher ground. The hurricane rains and wind start and you pray for a good outcome. The cleanup begins. When you live on the water you have to take the good weather and the bad weather. We have lived here 25 years and have had flooding from about 5 hurricanes. Each year we hope for a good year with no hurricanes.
